TO Core Study

St. James Town is the most populated neighbourhood in the TOcore study area at almost 26 000 people

It also has the 2nd highest proportion of renters (82%) of downtown neighbourhoods

Unemployment is the second highest in the Core and nearly a quarter of those employed have only part-time work

St. James Town has a high presence of children under 15 years and both the most single parent households and couples with children in the Core

St. James Town has the highest percentage of people 65 years and older and the highest number of children 0-9 years in the Core

One of the most diverse neighbourhoods in the Core with the highest presence of immigrants.
