
Cricket Reference Group Mandate and Roles

Council Directions Structures the Cricket Strategy

- up to 5 new cricket pitches within the next 20 years.
- regulation size
- may be shared with other uses (e.g., across two full size soccer fields)
- Park redevelopment and or partnerships with large landholders (e.g., schools, industrial areas, etc.)


- **upgrade 10% of all existing cricket pitches** (**approximately 3 pitches**) within the next 20 years to enhance capacity
- Upgrades include converting fields to higher classes through improvements to field quality and supporting amenities

Cricket Reference Group City Council direct the General Manager, Parks, Forestry and Recreation to establish a **Cricket Reference Group** with membership inclusive of community cricket organizations and City staff, with the work plan focused on **building organizational capacity**, and **increasing access to community cricket programs and facilities**








