



Homelessness in Toronto

 There are more than 7,800 people experiencing homelessness in Toronto

 New homes with supports are urgently needed to ensure everyone has a warm, safe place to call home











Providing dignity and supporting well-being





Creating new homes with supports at 75 Tandridge Crescent



The City of Toronto is proposing a five-storey modular building at 75 Tandridge to provide new homes with supports for approximately 113 people to support their health and wellbeing.



New warm, safe and permanent rental homes

The new homes will be:


- Dedicated to women, Indigenous residents, Black and racialized people, seniors, people with disabilities and other people who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness.
- Studio apartments with a bathroom and a kitchen.

The building includes amenities such as shared **laundry**, a commercial **kitchen**, a **dining area**, a **communal area** and **programming space**.



What is supportive housing?

Supportive housing provides permanent rental homes with support services





How supportive housing works

- Managed by non-profit housing operators that bring professional building management experience and expertise providing customized supports this is covered in the next slide
- All residents in supportive housing have made a choice to live there, pay rent, and are able to access the supports
- The operator takes care of the residents, the building and the property



A professional and experienced non-profit Housing Operator

The City will select an experienced non-profit Housing Operator to manage the building at 75 Tandridge based on a number of criteria including but not limited to:

- Effective in working with the Councillor and local community
- Experience managing affordable and supportive housing
- Strong track record in tenant engagement/communications
- Experience working with a range of tenants, including marginalized and vulnerable populations.



Planning Review and Approval Process

This proposal requires:

- Relief from the zoning by-law
- Site Plan approval


Planning and Housing Committee (May 20) and City Council (June 8) will consider a staff report recommending Council endorsement in principle of a request to the Province to put in place a Minister's Zoning Order to address any necessary zoning changes.

What is an MZO?

A Minister's Zoning Order (MZO) enables the Minister to regulate land use on specific lands and has been used to expedite time-sensitive projects.



Building Modular Housing

- Modular homes are an innovative and cost-effective way to build smallscale housing
- The homes are built off-site in a factory and transported to the site for assembly
- Construction and installation take approximately six to eight months, most of which occurs off-site

Playground and basketball court

The City is proposing to relocate the playground and the basketball court.

Neighbours and people who use these spaces will be consulted on the relocation and design of the playground and basketball court in mid-June
