Sanitary Trunk Sewer Rehabilitation in Jonathan Ashbridge Park, on Woodward Avenue from Queen Street East to Eastern Avenue

Contract: 20ECS-LU-03TT Start Date: June 14, 2021 End Date: March 2022

*Timeline is subject to change.

The City of Toronto will rehabilitate a section of the High Level Interceptor (HLI) Sanitary Trunk Sewer (STS) which runs through Jonathan Ashbridge Park to the Ashbridge Bay Treatment Plant. The work will also include rehabilitation of a local sanitary sewer along Woodward Avenue from Queen Street East to Eastern Avenue.


The HLI Sanitary Trunk Sewer is an underground pipe that collects wastewater from sewers and delivers it to the Ashbridges Bay Treatment Plant.

This project is part of the Council-approved 2021 Capital Works Program to renew the City's aging sewer infrastructure and will extend the service life of the trunk sewer section by approximately 50 years.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT COVID-19 AND CONSTRUCTION WORK IN TORONTO

WORK DETAILS

The City's contractor will:

- prepare the work area before construction begins;
- · reline the existing pipes using a trenchless method;
- install temporary pumps and pipes on Jonathan Ashbridge Park, Woodward Avenue and underneath Eastern Avenue to divert flow from the sewer so that it can be repaired from inside; and
- insert a resin-filled sock into the pipe through maintenance holes and cure it in place with steam to form a new pipe.



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WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION

- You may experience dust, noise and other inconveniences. The City will make efforts to reduce the impacts. We appreciate your patience.
- The City will not be responsible for damage to any privately owned items on City property.



Work Hours: Work will take place from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday to Friday, with work after hours and on weekends as required.



Pre-Construction Inspection: Capital Sewers Services, under contract to the City of Toronto, will survey all properties within 30 metres of the construction area before construction starts. The inspection will look at the interior and exterior of all properties to verify existing conditions. Although participation is voluntary, the City encourages all homeowners to participate. Without the survey, it will be difficult to confirm any claims of damage caused by construction.

Affected properties will receive a separate notice to set up an appointment. All inspection staff will wear photo I.D. and carry photo equipment for this work.




Important information for owners of sprinkler systems / heated driveways and private landscaping features. Property owners should remove items located within City property limits (boulevard) to avoid damage.

This includes items such as landscaping (plants and pavers), decorative objects, sprinkler systems or heated driveways. If you have a sprinkler system or heated driveway, please contact the Project Manager listed below.



Sewer Service Disruptions: If the sanitary sewer service from your property requires a disruption to complete repairs the contractor will provide at least 24-hour advance notice. During sanitary sewer service disruptions, you will be advised to limit your water use.



Physical Distancing: There are times when contractors need to communicate with homeowners about what is happening on-site. This could be about driveway access, water shut offs, pre-construction inspections, and site restoration work (landscaping, installing pavers etc.). Contractor's staff will be identifiable by their high-visibility clothing and will maintain physical distancing.



Site Safety: Workers on site are responsible for the work assigned to them. If you have construction questions or an issue on site – ask to be directed to the site inspector. If the site inspector is unavailable, contact the person listed at the end of this notice.



Road and Sidewalk Access: In order to complete the work in a safe manner, there will be road and sidewalk restrictions within the work zone. Access for emergency vehicles will be maintained at all times.

Driveway Access: The contractor will notify you of any temporary restrictions to your driveway access. If your property has two entrances, one entrance will be kept open at all times.



Traffic Management: Road users should expect delays and increased traffic on nearby main and side streets. Motorists are reminded that bicycles and cars will be sharing the lane. When driving, please be mindful of vulnerable road users.


Traffic on Woodward Avenue will be reduced to one lane.



Parking: This project will affect on-street parking. Parking in the active work zone is not permitted as space is needed for construction equipment and materials. If your parked vehicle affects construction work, it will be relocated with no charge to the owner. Please call 416-808-2222 for its location.
