Masks




The use of <u>face masks and coverings</u> is required in all indoor public spaces, under a City of Toronto <u>bylaw</u> and <u>O. Reg. 364/20</u>

Post signs in visible areas on the <u>proper use</u> of masks and how to safely put on and take off a mask

COVID-19 Wearing a mask: dos and don'ts Don't touch your face or mask while wearing it Do clean your hands before and after wearing it Don't hang your mask on Do ensure it covers your nose, mouth and chin your nose or chin Don't wear a mask if it is Do change your mask when wet or dirty hard to breathe Don't put masks on Do be respectful of people who can't wear masks children under age 2 Don't share your mask with Do keep 2 metres/6 feet from others **M** Toronto toronto.ca/COVID19

Physical Distancing





- All in-person instruction and on-campus activities at PSE institutions are planned to resume without physical distancing requirements or capacity limits. Masks and face coverings are still required for indoor settings
- General physical distancing, where possible, is still encouraged (e.g. elevators, entrances/exits, etc.)

Physical Distancing



- Designate and clearly mark specific, separate entrances and exits, and only permit entry and exit through these doors
- Develop and post clear traffic flow signs to minimize unnecessary interactions
- Limit/discourage large gatherings/assemblies.
 Consider virtual or outdoor options
- Install structural <u>barriers</u> and cordon off areas to restrict access to closed areas



Cleaning and Disinfection



Consider frequent cleaning and disinfecting of **high-touch surfaces** and **shared objects** at least twice a day and when visibly dirty

Educate and **train** facility staff on how to use cleaning agents and disinfectants, and ensure:


- Required disinfectant contact times are followed
- Use of safety precautions and required PPE
- Directions for where and how to securely store cleaning and disinfectant supplies



Heating Ventilation and Air Conditioning



 Consult an HVAC specialist to determine if the HVAC system is suitable for the type of setting, type of activity, number of occupants, and the length of time the space is occupied




- Increase the introduction and circulation of outdoor air by maximizing the outdoor air ratio of the HVAC system settings, or by opening windows and doors, where possible
- If using portable air purifiers/cleaners equipped with a HEPA filter, follow the manufacturer's directions to decide where best to place the device.
- Portable air cleaners are not a substitute for proper ventilation and other preventive measures

Screening Tool



- All staff, students, & visitors should complete a COVID-19 screening questionnaire before coming on campus every day, and should stay home if they answer YES to any of the questions
- Post signs in visible areas which clearly explains the screening process and the rules and conditions for entry
- Active screening is preferred, if possible



Screening Tool Changes



- Individuals who received a COVID-19 vaccination in the last 48 hours and are experiencing mild headache, fatigue, muscle ache and/or joint pain may be permitted to enter the school/workplace if:
 - They are not experiencing any other symptoms and pass all other screening questions, and
 - They wear a surgical/procedure mask
- Individuals who are fully vaccinated can select "No" for some questions

You may have mild reactions after the vaccine.






Rapid Antigen Testing



- If rapid testing is used, it should only be performed as a second screening step for individuals who have passed the health screening questionnaire
- Rapid testing should not be used to diagnose COVID-19 for a person who has symptoms or who has been exposed to a person with COVID-19
- A person with a positive result from a rapid test must seek laboratory-based PCR testing within 24 hours. They must isolate while waiting for their confirmatory test result
- Rapid testing does not replace other public health measures such as physical distancing and masking, even if a person tests negative'



International Students



 Notify all travellers returning from outside Canada about the <u>mandatory quarantine or isolation</u> order, and encourage students to review the <u>COVID-19</u>: <u>Travel</u> <u>Advice</u> web page



- Fully vaccinated travellers may be eligible for exemptions if they meet specific conditions. Please visit <u>COVID-19</u> <u>vaccinated travellers entering Canada</u> for more information
- International students can submit their COVID-19 immunization records for out of Ontario vaccination using <u>Toronto Public Health's online portal</u>



Dormitories/Residences





- Impose restrictions on living arrangements based on physical distancing, as well as for washrooms and common living spaces such as kitchenettes
- Set aside designated dormitories/private rooms to isolate and quarantine COVID-19 positive students or students with COVID-19 symptoms
- Support students who are quarantined or selfisolating:
 - Ensure policies, procedures, and programming are in place to allow for continued delivery of services and supports and/or learning and provide support and re-assurance
 - Ensure self-isolating students can receive deliveries of essential goods, like medications and groceries/meals, at their unit door so they can avoid non-essential trips outside
 - Ensure students are treated with respect, fairness and compassion with a focus on dignity and privacy protection

Close Contacts



- Students/staff/visitors who have been in close contact with a person with COVID-19 must <u>self-isolate</u> and <u>get tested</u>.
 - Individuals who are not fully vaccinated must self-isolate for at least 10 days from the last day they had close contact with the positive case.
 - Fully vaccinated close contacts may not be required to self-isolate if they:
 - have no symptoms related to COVID-19;
 - are not immunocompromised;
 - are not a resident at a long-term care or retirement home;
 - are not a hospital inpatient; and
 - have not been otherwise instructed to self-isolate for 10 days by TPH
 - fully vaccinated individuals should still monitor for symptoms of COVID-19

Encouraging Vaccination



- Encourage staff and students who are 12 years of age and older to get vaccinated with the COVID-19 vaccine. Read and share information about the vaccine and where to get vaccinated
- Develop policy measures to optimize vaccination coverage rates of students and staff in post-secondary institution campuses and in congregate student-living settings
- Post signs and share <u>COVID-19 vaccine resources</u>, available in multiple languages

RE: Optimizing COVID-19 vaccine coverage in post-secondary institutions and congregate student living settings

Dear Post-Secondary Institution and Student Living Setting Administrator,

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, Toronto Public Health (TPH) has worked extensively with community partners, including post-secondary institutions and congregate living settings, to prevent and mitigate the spread of COVID-19. These mutual efforts have allowed the prioritization of the health and safety of all those who live, play and learn in the City of Toronto.

With decreasing COVID-19 case rates and increasing vaccination coverage across all age groups, the Ministry of College and Universities and many post-secondary institutions are planning to return to in-person campus activities for the fall 2021 term and beyond. Although this return is welcomed with excitement and anticipation, we must continue to use public health measures and policies that reduce risk of COVID-19 given the presence of variants of concern, and their role in community transmission. Preventive measures and policies will help us progress toward our goal of ending the pandemic.

TPH strongly supports post-secondary institutions and congregate student- living settings' initiatives to increase COVID-19 vaccine confidence and uptake. This includes equitable barrier-free access to vaccination and provision of clear evidence-based information. Vaccination is a key public health measure to reduce community spread of COVID-19.

TPH recommends policy measures to optimize vaccination coverage rates of students and staff in post-secondary institution campuses and in congregate student-living settings. We are available for consultation on vaccination policy development and implementation to increase vaccination rates.




Vaccination is a key public health measure to help ensure a safe return to campus and residences for all staff, students and faculty of post-secondary education institutions and student residences.

Everyone 12 years of age and over in Ontario is currently eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. Two doses of COVID-19 vaccine are needed for the best protection against COVID-19 and its more transmissible variants. Some post-secondary institutions have already instituted mandatory vaccination policies that promote health and safety measures to protect individuals living, working and studying in these settings. TPH supports the Ministry of Colleges and Universities' promotional efforts of vaccines and establishment of vaccination clinics to continue progress on vaccination rates as part the anticipated return to full in-person instruction and on-campus activities. These mandatory vaccination policies are also supported by both Colleges Ontario and the Council of Ontario Universities to ensure the optimal public health protection for all staff, students and faculty.

People who are fully vaccinated are less likely to get infected with COVID-19 and spread it to others. While there is a small chance that people who are fully vaccinated may become infected with the virus, they are much less likely to experience severe illness and become hospitalized.

The following toolkit is a summary and collection of COVID-19 vaccine resources for post-secondary education institutions and private student residences to be used as part of public health planning and policy development for the fall 2021 term and beyond.

Establishing a Vaccination Policy



A vaccination policy is an important measure post-secondary institutions can implement to protect their community and help reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission

Key Components in a Vaccination Policy

- 1. Identify the scope and purpose
- 2. List action steps staff and students must take
- 3. Set deadlines for when actions must be taken
- 4. List available supports for vaccination
- 5. Provisions for unvaccinated staff and students
- 6. Non-Compliance
- 7. Privacy Considerations
- 8. Staff Contact



Approved Vaccines



Four vaccines are currently approved by Health Canada:

- Pfizer-BioNTech
- Moderna
- AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD
- Janssen (Johnson & Johnson)

The Government of Ontario also recognizes doses of COVID-19 vaccines included in the World Health Organization (WHO) Emergency Use Listing as valid in Ontario including:

- Sinopharm/Beijing Bio-Institute of Biological Products
- Sinovac vaccines.

Collecting Private Health Information (PHI)



Postsecondary institutions must comply with the <u>Personal Health Information</u> <u>Protection Act</u> (PHIPA) when collecting personal health information from staff and/or students including proof of vaccination



Vaccine Exemptions



Medical Exemptions

- Documentation should be signed by a physician or nurse practitioner, state that the individual cannot be vaccinated against COVID-19, and identify the time duration of this exemption
- The Province and the Ontario Medical Association (OMA) are compiling a list of acceptable and specific medical exemptions which will become available soon



Ontario Human Rights Code

 Legal consultation is recommended for any institutions seeking to establish an exemption policy in accordance with the Ontario Human Rights Code
