Study Overview



Background

- Toronto's <u>Parkland Strategy</u> identified an area centred on the Oakwood Avenue and St. Clair Avenue West intersection as an "Area of Parkland Need".
- "Areas of Parkland Need" are high-need areas, identified based on compounding factors such as low park supply, low income, and high growth, where the City will prioritize parks planning and the creation of new parks.
- The Oakwood-St Clair area has notably **low levels** of existing parkland.
- The Oakwood-St Clair Parks Plan is one of the first of these local parks-focused plans.



The Plan identifies opportunities to:



Improve existing parks

Create **new** parks





Improve access and connections between parks and other public spaces.

This plan will be used to inform parkland acquisition and park and open space improvement projects as well as operations in the short term and for years to come.

Online Engagement



Social Pinpoint

An online mapping tool was used to collect feedback, ideas and insights. The tool allowed participants to identify specific places on a map. In total, Social Pinpoint received **over 700 comments** and thousands of data points.



Survey responses were received from **1,974 people**. The survey was aimed at understanding the use of public space in the study area, barriers, and needed improvements.

Findings – Key Themes



There is not enough parkland serving the study area

 Local parkland provision in much of the study area is between 0 and 4 m2 per person - well below the Citywide average of 28 m2 of parkland per person

Infl TORONTO

"We just need more greenspace in this area. Especially in the centre of the study area, where there is a real desert of community outdoor/green space."



Park walkability

Some parts of the study area do not have any parks within 500 m of their house (a 5-10 minute walk)

"The parks just feel FAR with 2 toddlers! A new park in the study area would be fantastic."



Recreation facilities

There are opportunities for more recreation facilities within and around the study area

- There is a playground gap west of Oakwood Ave
- A basketball court and skatepark / spot could address gaps within and north of the study area
- More thought needs to be given to the recreation needs of older children and teens

"Students skateboard in the street and schoolyards because there aren't parks nearby."

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Park visibility, accessibility, amenities, and design quality

There are opportunities to improve park visibility, accessibility, selection of amenities, and design quality

- Some areas of parks are not accessible for users with mobility devices
- There is a need to improve park landscaping and design within parks and at the zone between parks and their surroundings





Tree canopy

There is lower tree canopy coverage and higher heat vulnerability in the western portion of the study area.

 Canopy in the study area as a whole is 28%, on par with the City-wide average, however it decreases between Dufferin Street and Prospect Cemetery





Tree canopy

• Lower levels of tree canopy likely contribute to a higher heat vulnerability index score

86% of survey respondents would like to see **more shade**, including trees, within the study area.



Some streets and laneways could be reimagined to enhance the public realm.

Some engagement participants do not feel comfortable and safe while walking or cycling in the area.



Volume of Comments

"Public Realm improvement can take place in a number of ways ... the planting of street trees in areas with the least shade, widening sidewalks and improving pedestrian connections along key north/ south streets..."

Spaces for dogs

There is a need to consider provision and design of spaces for offleash dogs.

- Some engagement participants noted concerns with the condition and design of existing dog parks
- Engagement also highlighted concerns over access to dog parks and the use of spaces not designated as off-leash areas, including schoolyards





Schoolyards

There are opportunities to improve schoolyards by making them more accessible and useable for students and the broader community.



• Schoolyards play a significant role in the area's open space network, but are not always accessible and could use improvements

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1 - Expand existing parks

Initiatives:

- **Pursue expansions of the following parks**, noted in order of priority:
 - Roseneath Park
 - Charles Brereton Park
 - The new park at 261 Nairn Avenue
 - Graham Park
 - Mount Royal Parkette

Process

- The creation of new and expanded parkland is an incremental process.
- PFR encourages landowners who are interested in selling their lands to consider selling to the City.

2 – Introduce new parks

Initiatives:

- Investigate repurposing some of the study area's 7 City-owned parking lots, or portions thereof, as parks. Candidates for further investigation include:
 - 7 Norton Ave
 - 141 Greenlaw Ave
 - 64 St. Clair Ave W
 - 11 Kenwood Ave
- **Pursue other opportunities to acquire new parkland** within or close to the study area through either:
 - Lot purchases and/or
 - Parkland dedications from (re)development

Parking lot conversion

- Conversion of any of the area's City-owned parking lots is subject to ongoing investigation with the Toronto Parking Authority and CreateTO, as part of the City's parking portfolio review.
- PFR has proactively indicated interest in the above lots.

3 - Introduce new outdoor recreation facilities

Initiatives:

- Pending community consultation, introduce a new playground at the new park at 261 Nairn Ave
- Consider additional playgrounds as part of any new or expanded park west of Oakwood Avenue
- Investigate potential for smaller-scale play features in parks throughout the study area
- Investigate delivering additional playgrounds with Community Access Agreements on school sites west of Oakwood Avenue

Designing spaces for play

- New and enhanced playgrounds and play spots in the area will be designed considering the needs of older kids and tweens
- Small-scale play opportunities could include naturalized features like boulders

3 - Introduce new outdoor recreation facilities

Initiatives:

- Introduce a new basketball court within or north of the study area
- Introduce a new skatepark / skate spot / skate dots within or north of the study area
- Investigate opportunities for outdoor fitness equipment in the south-east quadrant of the study area

Fairbank Memorial Park has been identified as a good candidate for a skatepark pending further investigation and community engagement.

4 - Enhance existing parks and outdoor recreation facilities

Initiatives:

- Improve Charles Brereton Park
- Work with community to enhance aspects of Wychwood Barns
 Park (playground and art component) and accelerate the project
- Investigate wayfinding and other improvements to Graham Park
- Implement improvements to the Earlscourt Park pathway
 network
- Investigate further improving Earlscourt park's interface with surrounding streets

Park improvements in the works

- **261 Nairn Park** Park design and naming (construction in 2022)
- Graham Park Accessible picnic tables, benches, ping pong table (in delivery)
- Earlscourt Park
 - New splashpad (in delivery)
 - St. Clair Ave frontage improvements, including an undulating curb with benches and permeable pavers (2021-2022)
 - Improved pathways a concept has been developed and more details will be available soon
- Wychwood Barns Park Playground enhancement (2023-2024 – subject to budget approval)
- **Roseneath Park** Playground enhancement (2029-2029)

4 - Enhance existing parks and outdoor recreation facilities

Initiatives:

- Investigate opportunities to deliver amenities and enhancements identified by the community in parks across the study area, including:
 - Indigenous Placemaking and Placekeeping elements
 - More accessible seating
 - More opportunities for community gardening
 - More pollinator gardens
 - More medicine gardens
 - Winter-focused amenities (e.g. enhanced lighting, fire pits, etc.)
 - Game spaces (e.g. table tennis)
 - More art (e.g. murals and spaces for art programming)
- Consider opportunities for improvements to park landscaping alongside all capital projects

5 - Plant more trees

Initiatives:

- Plant more trees in existing parks, including:
 - The new park at 261 Nairn Avenue
 - Earlscourt Park
 - Wychwood Barns Park
- Work with homeowners and community orgs to increase tree provision on private property in the west of the study area by promoting:
 - The Residential Street Tree Planting Program
 - Urban Forestry Grants and Incentives (e.g. LEAF Backyard Tree Planting Program, Neighbourhood Tree Giveaway Program)
- Work with Transportation Services to identify opportunities for tree planting on streets in the west of the study area
- Work with school boards to **plant trees on school sites** in the west of the study area



Planned Activities 2021-2022

- 300+ street tree plantings
- Tree planting at Earlscourt Park, Humewood Park and Wychwood Barns



6 – Improve spaces for dogs

Initiatives:

- Explore improvements to the 4 existing Dog Off-Leash Areas (DOLAs) within or close to the study area
- Work with the development industry to ensure that developments along St Clair Ave provide pet amenities and spaces to reduce pressures on parks.
- Consider opportunities for future DOLAs as part of new and expanded parks, where appropriate

Geary Avenue Parkette Expansion

- The Geary Avenue Parkette expansion (complete in late 2022) will include a new DOLA
- This new DOLA means improved access and choice for dog-owners in the southern portion of the study area

7 – Work with our civic partners to improve the public realm

Initiatives:

- Collaborate with Transportation Services to expand public space and **improve the public realm on streets adjacent to parks** where feasible
- Consider public realm improvements as part of planned Transportation Services capital projects (e.g. road reconstruction) within the study area
- Collaborate with local Business Improvement Areas to investigate the feasibility of making public realm improvements to under-used areas of the right of way, where feasible



Public Realm Improvements

 Public realm improvements could include elements such as street trees, narrowing of the road through curb bumpouts, benches, enhanced paving treatments, etc.

Initiatives:

- Investigate delivering improvements to school grounds, with community access agreements, including:
 - Completing the Oakwood Collegiate Master Plan
 - Loretto College Improvements
- Advocate for community access outside of school hours where it is currently restricted
- Share community concerns regarding off-leash dogs at school sites



Rawlinson Community School Outdoor Area Revitalization Project

- Partially funded with Section 37 funds and includes a community access agreement
- Phase 1 (2020) included new play equipment, reconfiguration of the multipurpose field, etc.
- Phase 2 (2022) includes additional play equipment upgrades and seating



Planned park improvements underway or in PFR's 10-year Capital Budget and Plan (e.g. new Nairn park, Earlscourt Park, planned playground enhancements)



Further funding earmarked for additional park improvements in this area in the current 10-year Capital Plan to follow the conclusion of this study



New parks and expansion opportunities secured through development (on-site and offsite dedication) and City-initiated acquisitions



Alignment of planned parks and transportation projects to maximize public space outcomes



Dissemination of ideas and collaboration with Parks operations staff, City agencies (e.g. TPA) and external partners (e.g. school boards)

Each park-specific project will be subject to project-specific engagement processes
