New Park at 300 The East Mall Phase 1: Proposed Design Engagement Summary Report

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Project Background



A new park is coming to 300 The East Mall!

There will be a new development at 300 The East Mall, which will include residences and new commercial space. The developer is required to build a park as part of a development agreement with the City, and a new 2,040 m2 park that will be created at the corner of Bloor Street West and The East Mall (east of Highway 427). The project is funded by the developer and the design will be led by Ferris and Associates Inc. The City of Toronto will coordinate and oversee the design.

This project is in the early design phase, and will be further developed using the survey results and feedback during the community engagement process.

This report documents the feedback received on the Proposed Design during phase 1 of the engagement process through the following inputs:

Proposed Design

A proposed design is prepared at an early phase of the design process, and broadly outlines the proposed amenities, design features and layout of a space. For this round of consultation, City staff were looking for feedback on <u>one Proposed Design</u> for the new park, shown below:

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The proposed design includes:

- An outdoor fitness station with a rubberized surface in the north-west corner of the park
- Small playground with rubberized surface and seating area
- Large central paved plaza with a splash pad
- Large shade structure with seating below
- Accessible paths throughout the park
- New planting areas including shrub planting and enhanced trees
- A small plaza entrance at the corner of The East Mall and Bloor Street West
- A small mounded lawn area at the north end of the park •
- Light pole fixtures throughout the park

The new park design will provide light levels and sightlines that will conform to best practices for public safety. Lighting fixtures will be shown in greater detail in the next step of design.

Project Timeline

The anticipated schedule for this park project is as follows:

- September 2021: Hire a design team •
- Fall 2021 to Summer 2022: Community engagement and design development
- Summer to Winter 2023: Detailed design
- Spring 2023: Construction starts
- Spring 2024: Construction complete, park opens

How We Reached People

In general, the community was informed of engagement activities through social and print media, listed below:

Print Media

Signage near the site

Project information was displayed on 36x48 notice boards placed near the new park site. These notice boards provided information about the project, details about the online survey, and how to access additional information on the project webpage.

Community Postcards

5,000 postcards advertising the project webpage, virtual meeting and online survey were delivered to addresses in the neighbourhood within 2km of the site.

Digital Media

eFlyer

A digital flyer was circulated to community groups, nearby schools and the local Councillor's Office for additional distribution.

Social Media and Digital Ads

The City of Toronto used its Facebook, Instagram and Twitter accounts to promote the online survey through paid advertisements and organic posts from February 7 to 27th, 2022.

Project Webpage

A webpage (<u>toronto.ca/300TheEastMallPark</u>) was set up to act as a communications portal to inform the public about the new park project. The webpage hosts all up to date information regarding the project, including links to the online survey and a sign-up button for e-updates.

What We Heard

Virtual Community Meeting

A virtual community meeting was held on February 7, 2022 from 6:30 to 8:00 pm to share the Proposed Design for community feedback. Approximately ~15 people attended the session (excluding the consulting and staff team).

Community members were invited to learn more about the project, see the concept design and site furniture options for the new park, and share their questions and thoughts through a virtual Q&A. The following is a summary of the meeting:

Key Feedback Highlights

Discussion focused on the proposed design, park amenities and layout, as well as questions of clarification regarding the new park site and safety considerations. The following is a summary of what we heard:

- Overall, most attendees liked the proposed design for the new park.
- Many attendees brought forward concerns about a nearby, high-traffic intersection and safety considerations that would need to be taken into account to make the park more welcoming and safe for pedestrians and cyclists.

• Many attendees asked questions about if an off-leash dog area could be added into the park design, given the large influx of new residents into the area with the added developments.

Below are questions of clarification received during the community meeting. Responses from the project team are also provided.

1. What measures have been taken to make the new park safer for everyone? The intersection is not pedestrian-friendly.

Staff Comments:

- Programming has been setback from the street intentionally for this reason. Large naturalized perennial beds and tree planting buffer the central area of the park from the intersection. Open fencing could be included in a further iteration of the design.
- We are proposing a fence around the playground space for additional safety, and have provided lots of room for people to move into the park so people aren't forced closer to the road.
- We do consider CEPTED (Crime Prevention through Environmental Design) in the design, so that we have clear sightlines through the park to create a safer and more welcoming space overall.

2. Can there be an off-leash dog park in the design?

Staff Comments:

- The site is too small to implement a dog park (which must be 2000m2 minimum). It would end up taking the entire space for the new park, and we are aiming to provide something for everyone in the new park design
- As part of the new development a large off-leash area will be created on the north-west side of the development site to help elevate pressure on the neighbourhood.
- There are more and more OLAs being discussed as we recognize there is a need for these spaces in the neighbourhood, but there is a degree of difficulty in finding an appropriate spot.

Online Survey

In February 2022, the project team launched an online survey to collect feedback on the proposed design for the new park. Responses to the survey will help to generate ideas, and confirm priorities for a Preferred Design of the park.

The survey had three components:

- Background and Park Vision helping us to know what your vision for the new park is
- Proposed Design providing specific feedback on the proposed design, layout, amenities, shade structure options, and letting us know what may have been missing in the design
- Participant Demographics and Follow Up this section asks about who is filling out the survey, to help us understand who it reached and whose feedback we may be missing

The online survey was available from February 7 to February 27, 2022. The survey received a **total of 1,400 responses**, which included input from 2,765 participants of various ages.

This section presents the survey results and a summary of the common themes of comments. A full look at the survey results can be found in Appendix A.

On Survey Respondents

- The survey received a total of **1,400 survey responses**, which included input from **2,765 individuals**.
 - The majority of survey participants were in the 40 to 55 years old (36%), 30 to 39 years old (29%) and 56 to 64 years old (15%).
- The majority of respondents found out about the survey from social media (78%)
- The majority of respondents have access to private outdoor space like a yard (55%)
 - 23% of respondents only have access to public spaces like parks
 - o 15% of respondents have access to semi-private/shared outdoor space
 - o 6% of respondents preferred not to answer
- More than half of respondents identified as homeowners (75%) and 15% as renters
 - 4% of respondents identified as permanently living with parent(s) or other family member(s).
 - 5%) preferred not to answer
- 7% of respondents identified as a person with a disability

- o 82% of respondents did not identify as a person with a disability
- o 10% of respondents preferred not to answer
- 1% of respondents don't know
- A majority of respondents (81%) live between 500 metres to 3 km from the park location
 - \circ $\,$ 14% of respondents live between 3 to 5 km from the park
 - 2% of respondents live 6 to 15 km from the park
 - 2% of respondents live more than 16 km from the park
 - 1% of respondents preferred not to answer
- Half of respondents do not have children in their household that use City of Toronto parks and playgrounds (49%)
 - Some respondents (22%) have children age 6 to 12 years old that use parks and playgrounds
 - Some respondents (19%) have teens/youth that use parks and playgrounds
 - Some respondents (18%) have children age 2 to 5 years old that use parks and playgrounds
 - A few respondents (10%) have children under 2 years old that use parks and playgrounds

Park Visioning

- To get to the new park (respondents could select multiple options):
 - 76% of respondents would walk
 - o 39% of respondents would use a personal vehicle
 - o 33% of respondents would bike
 - o 8% of respondents would use public transportation
 - 5% of respondents would use a scooter and/or skateboard
 - o 4% of respondents would use a mobility device and/or stroller
- When visiting the park (respondents could select multiple options):
 - The majority of respondents would visit with their spouse or partner (64%), family (45%), children (45%) or friends (41%)
 - Around a third of respondents would visit alone (31%) or with pets (30%)
 - 1% chose other, which included grandchildren
- The most popular activities respondents would like to do at the park are:
 - Relaxing in the seating areas (66%)
 - Enjoying and observing planting areas (53%)
 - Sitting and/or eating (49%)
- Less popular activities included:
 - Using the children's play area (38%)
 - Meet people/gather with others (35%)

- Exercising (34%)
- Walking a pet (34%)
- Travelling through the park to get to nearby stores (34%)
- Use a water play area (29%)
- Games (i.e. chess, ping pong etc.) (18%)
- o 8% chose other, which included roller skating
- When asked to identify the importance of a list of potential features for the new park:
 - o 70% of respondents thought trees were very important
 - o 61% of respondents thought seating areas were very important
 - 58% of respondents though shade was very important
 - o 56% of respondents thought accessible pathways was very important
 - o 50% of respondents thought open grass/lawn area was very important
 - o 41% thought drinking fountain/bottle fillers was very important
 - Around a third of respondents thought senior-oriented spaces (38%), central plaza space for gathering (36%), and a pollinator garden (37%) were very important
 - Almost half of respondents (43%) thought a splash pad was not important
 - Around a third (32%) of respondents thought a junior or senior children's playground was not important

Design layout

- Half of respondents (49%) were satisfied with the proposed layout
 - A quarter of respondents (25%) were neutral
 - 15% of respondents were very satisfied
 - 8% of respondents were dissatisfied and 3% of respondents were very dissatisfied

Balance between pavement and green space

- The majority of survey respondents (64%) felt that there was the right balance between paved surfaces and green space in the proposed design
 - \circ $\,$ 31% of respondents felt there was too much paved surface
 - \circ 5% of respondents felt there was too much green space

Seating

- Half of survey respondents (50%) felt there was the right amount of seating in the proposed design
 - Almost half of respondents (48%) felt there was not enough seating
 - o 2% of respondents felt there was too much seating

Amount of plants and trees

- The majority of survey respondents (66%) felt there was the right amount of plants and trees in the proposed design
 - o 26% of respondents felt there was not enough plants and trees
 - 7% of respondents felt there was too many plans and trees

Other features

The survey provided respondents with a series of statements about the elements in the proposed design and asked if they agree, neither agree nor disagree, or disagree.

I like the inclusion of the outdoor fitness area

I like the inclusion of the small playground

- When asked what features respondents liked the most in the proposed design, the top 5 responses were:
 - Large shade structure with seating below (59%)
 - New planting areas incusing shrub planting and trees (45%)
 - Outdoor fitness station (41%)

- Water bottle filling station (38%)
- Light pole fixtures throughout the park (37%)
- When asked about what features respondents disliked in the proposed design, the top 5 responses were:
 - I like all the features shown (43%)
 - Splash pad in central plaza (30%)
 - Outdoor fitness station (17%)
 - Small playground with rubberized surface (15%)
 - The central plaza (13%)
- When asked about preferences for the playground options, almost half of respondents (45%) liked option 1
 - 36% of respondents like option 2
 - 19% of respondents had no preference
- When asked about preferences for the seating options, almost half of respondents (44%) liked option 2
 - 38% of respondents like option 1
 - 18% of respondents had no preference

Additional comments on the park design

When asked if they had any additional comments or suggestions on the proposed design, 328 respondents provided additional feedback. Top comments and suggestions are below, with the number of respondents sharing this sentiment in parentheses.

- Provided general comments or comments not applicable to the question being asked (55)
- Indicated similar facilities exist nearby (40)
- Were in favour of a skate park (37)
- Want more greenery like grass and flowers (26)
- Were concerned about safety, with some emphasizing the proximity to the busy road nearby (23)
- Provided comments on the park size being small and/or preferring a bigger park (21)
- Want a dog park (21)
- Want senior adult facilities (21)
- Want more seating (20)
- Want accessibility for children and/or those with disabilities (16)

Who did we hear from?

Participants were asked to provide demographic information. This helps the City better understand who participated and whether particular groups in the community were missed during the engagement process.

A summary of the demographic findings can be found in Appendix A.

Next Steps

The feedback received from this phase of community engagement will inform the next step in the design process for the new park.

- Parks are not just for the young or old, which is what this survey seems to be focused on. Millennials make up a significant portion of the residents living in the new nearby condos so make sure you are creating spaces for them. There are already 3 play structures from Valhalla Inn to Bloor. There should be space to have a picnic or play lawn games. This design is child centric since the splash pad is right in the middle of what is supposed to be a community space. Lots of people want a space where they can be outside of their small condo but not be surrounded / sandwiched between children's areas. Please remember to consider us too! Often feel like our voice is missed in these new development areas.

- Looks great. Much needed. Garbage and recycling bins and poop bags for dogs
- All of the fitness/playground features will be trashed within a year. - Need convenient and adequate parking for people driving to the park.
- Overall looks good minus the overwhelming central pavement some for the splash pad is good but it would be great to incorporate some garden space as well rather than boxed out shrub planting (which is not at all fun for children and doesn't serve for much of an educational moment or eye catching colourful [naturally colourful] focal point for children) a pollinators garden would be fantastic in an area instead. Would flowers be trampled by school children? Possible,but it would be much nicer. Can even include seating and games tables in naturalized tree canopy not only the trellis to balance a structured space with a natural space for those wishing to sit, eat and/or play a game. Indifferent about the exercise area as it will likely end up being used as more of a playground for older children but that's not necessarily a bad thing. The proximity to the school may make it used widely by the students during recess (assuming they're allowed off the school property during recess/lunch).
- We need places people can sit in the grass, have a picnic, and watch the kids play on structures or in the grass.
- Pollinator/butterfly garden would be nice.
- In my opinion you are trying to jam too much into a small space. There is a significant sized park very close by on East mall that has a playground and splash pad. This park is on the corner of a busy intersection which is not ideal for children so why not simplify the design and to one that is more conducive for adults to meet and sit. Incorporate more seating and more shaded space. Regarding the playground, children love digging equipment but so do neighbourhood cats.
- Muskoka like chairs would be nice. Similar to Humber bay park
- Thank you! This is exciting !
- Spot for booking picnics
- Would it be any space left for some tennis courts?
- Spaces should allow for couples and singles to use without being overrun by families and children. Play areas should be well separated from areas that will be used by older people
- Please design something different than the park up the road but keep both, we need them both given the increase in people.
- Public toilets
- I prefer natural look vs modern look, eapecially for the shades
- I would like to see a more accessible play ground for all children of all abilities including special needs.
- The park is too small considering the condos will be there and the population.

- We need a small dog leash free zone with fresh water and fence and grass.
- Not enough seating or gathering space
- I feel the playground area should be larger as there are a lot of children in the area that would benefit. We need to focus on giving kids outdoor space so they can be active and have fun.
- The idea of a park located right beside the 427 seems a bit ridiculous. Exhaust fumes? Noise?
- Where is the parking space?
- The kids play area is way too small. There is a lack of nice playgrounds for kids in this area. It needs to be bigger. There is a water splash pad only two minutes up the road, way not make the playground bigger. Also more exercise equipment for adults and seniors would be good.
- I wish there was an enclosed area for off leash dogs.
- Safety for the children from the busy roads. Lots of lighting at night for safety.
- Nothing about the design but wondering why we need another park so close to another
- Neither Active Zone seems wholly impressive is there a practical way to determine feasibility of other options?
- Are you taking into consideration amount of pollution from roads? Is there a way to protect from this? Considering children are more vulnerable. But really happy to see greenspace here. Also any washroom facilities?
- I would like to see something for people with physical disabilities. Especially at the park for children to have access to be able to safely play.
- Pet friendly No smoking Keep it well maintained
- Splash pad we have just couple of meters down the road , we need more things added for for children structures or any other type of activity but no splash pads
- I look forward to seeing it once completed, I think it will be a great place for people to take there children and enjoy family time with some sun and shade
- Do we really need another splash park? There is already one located on the East Mall close to this area. It would service better to have more playground equipment, or more green space for free play.
- All future park plans need to incorporate a substantial amount of space for seniors as our population ages. The elderly are a forgotten group in our society.
- Absolutely love the idea!!!
- More accessible features and more sensory structures
- I have concerns that this park is proposed at a very busy corner rather than putting a building there and the park behind it. To much of a risk of a car crashing into the park and hurting or worse killing some one.
- It would be nice to have butterfly garden, and and some elements for teens.
- Ensure space for picnics on the grass as tables often fill up so important to ensure families can set out on the grass
- This looks amazing. Can't wait for it to be built!
- An enclosed area for a dog run / leash free area
- You need to have annuals and perennials for flowers and colour.

- I think the park is trying to hard to be everything to everyone the space seems to small to accommodate children's activity and is too close to traffic. I would think there is a splash already available on the East Mall, why do a second one?
- The East Mall park at 355 the East Mall already provides a splash pad and area for young children. Alternatively we do not have outdoor spaces designed for teens and seniors, the majority of the population in this area. Please design the new Park with seniors and teens as the main focus. Thank you for the opportunity to share.
- It's such a small space, there is no option for park.
- Thank you so much for all the time putting into this park
- Pickleball court
- Plaza space way too big. It will be used as a walkway and nothing more. You need more grass, trees, flowers so that people can sit in nature.
- More sport friendly options. Basketball, rink, tennis.
- I would like to see flower beds. Annuals, perennials, spring bulbs, flowering shrubs and pollinator type plants. That is very important to me and my family.
- Should be family friendly for children
- Needs mire biking infrastructure
- More green space and less concrete space.
- We need a small dog park area!
- Add ping pong tables. Also, I would love to see a small, enclosed dog park but it seems there is no space.
- Please ensure accessibility for children with disabilities
- Place fences near the street side but with entryways for access to the park & maybe water stations near the street side for runners and on the exercise area
- Seats with backs please!
- Should cut down on noise pollution and unsightly road views
- Will there be safety bollards aligned across Bloor and East mall?
- Some seating for family picnic tables
- It is not inviting for pet owners, the little greenery there is will become saturated with dog urine and smell. As it will be used to take dogs to use as washroom. There are tons of new pet owners due to pandemic and every green space is being fought over between children and dogs.
- Fence as there are many kids there and it's a very busy intersection. Splash pad is not a good idea as there is no parking either and the place is small. People there tend to socialize a lot, it will be used as more of a meeting place.
- Basketball courts or small turf for soccer with nets needed...look at ethnic makeup of area. Kids become teens then adults and need space to use and play. Have a location for community policing too to rotate in. Presence of police and relationships will benefit .
- the more green the better. since i don't have children i'd rather a quieter, more natural space, especially when children already have school playgrounds.
- There is a splash pad down the street at the East Mall Park. Shouldn't it have something unique?
- I like the idea of a more contemporary open design that incorporates wood to give it warmth. Something that suits needs of all ages, a gathering place that

encourages community building. A place that could host community events, has a neighbour hood feel and is safe and accessible.

- Lighting is important, it wasn't highlighted in the concept design but I'm assuming it exists. It was be neat to have sign language teaching boards in the park. I've seen them on other play grounds, like what the alphabet is in sign language. Similarity could do braille as well to introduce kids into alternative communication methods in public spaces.
- Include a skate park/ice rink
- Better quality playground for ages 2 to 5
- Air quality next to 427 highway is not a good place to put physical activities for children or adults. Planting trees and adding more green space would be a better plan. Let's clean the air before we expose our children to all the pollution. Adding more greenspace may also help with the noise from the highway too.
- - people prefer to lay out on blankets etc on a lawn or sit at normal picnic tables rather than being confined to the designated seating area
- Leash-free area instead of playground. There are a lot of play areas in the neighbourhood but no leash-free parks.
- It would be great if the city builds some new schools in the area as well as better infrastructure. Giving permits to build so many buildings around this area but not having builders to also build new schools is a not right.
- Please take into account that this work will create a huge traffic issue . I live on Laurel Ave and would like the city to either install the traffic light or a crosswalk.

- Location is not ideal. Traffic around that area will be clogged. Too close to highway noise

- The playground needs to be a bit bigger to include swings. 2 types of swings for under snd over 4 years old. Trellis cover is not great. It does not protect anyone enough from rain or sun or heat
- Have ping pong tables and maybe a small washroom hut?
- Swings
- Please have a pull up thing for exercise. There is a children's splash just North on The East Mall.
- Needs a bigger play area/park structure for kids
- Ping pong tables please!
- More focus on seniors and older adults with a focus on a beautiful garden and places to sit quietly with friends (not near a splash pad or playground).
- What are the plans for pets? What is the purpose of the fences? No mention.
- I feel this area is too small. What is being done for the school across the street?
- There is a splash pad already that is 200m away. Seems like a waste.
 Playground should be option one as it hits the most age groups. I question why a community garden couldn't be incorporated
- Please consider a dog park. There is a splash pad and playground across the street. There is nowhere in the area to run the dogs off leash.

- A tennis court and a bigger park area would be ideal.
- More grass
- Due to the very close proximity to the 427, noise reducing/sound blocking structures, trees etc. would be very welcome.
- There is already a splash pad down the street on East Mall, so I don't see this as completely necessary. I love the idea of added trees and fitness areas/structures for children and adults
- There should be sufficient trees and shrubs to provide shade. Also, it's a very busy corner re traffic.
- Should not be called a park. Its more of an outdoor space mainly to be utilized by the new condo developments.
- He shades structure should be a key design feature integrated to the design language of the park
- Would like to see playground area larger because splash pad is used only a few months a year. Similar to Michael Power Park so many kids in buildings, need playground to serve 12 months a year.
- Make sure interface between busy street and children using the park is safe. Bloor has become much much busier since the Dundas/bloor interchange at Kipling was straightened out.
- I think the playground needs to be bigger! That's why I said it was my least favourite feature. It should take up more real estate and have more equipment and features
- Some more benches please. I cannot tell from the design whether or not there are sufficient benches. I see only two benches on the west side. Eg if a senior is waking around and wants to take a break.
- Please ensure there is ample lighting, not too many trees/bushes. To ensure the area is safe and allows people to feel safe walking through if it is darker outside. Assure that there is visibility. Not too many shrubs. It's better to have the area more open so that people feel safe when using the park or walk through. Clear pathways. Ensuring that the public feels safe should be priority. Really looking forward to having this park added in Etobicoke. Thank you!
- I enjoy quiet spaces to read and enjoy nature/surrounded by trees. I would like some seating to be included AWAY from the kids play areas. I am a female and would enjoy walking in the evening. Please make sure this space is well lit.
- Please included pollinator plants/flowers. Very important to myself and what I would like to see more of in our community.
- In Guelph they have nice parks to model after
- Did I mention a skatepark? Super super popular and they bring young and older people together I.e. parents who have taken up skateboarding and are doing it with their kids.
- The park should be focused on older adults as there are large populations of 'seniors' ie. Zoomers, who are active but don't have a place where they can do outdoor activities. It would be great if the 'playground' was for them instead of children.
- Leash free dog area

- It needs a washroom
- I would like to see a larger play area.
- The park in my opinion should be about green space not concrete,
- Basketball! The game is growing so much in Toronto after the raptors won. Etobicoke needs more basketball courts. There are barely any near the 427. The city needs to step up and build a basketball court.
- Don't put playground structures that kids don't play with. Too many parks have equipment kids don't use. More slides, swings, running areas. No spinners or climbers that kids just don't use.
- More green space please!!
- Will there be noise dampening features for the 427 noise?
- Please consider the accessibility of the playground for kids with disabilities. Most of the playground equipment pictured would be inaccessible or hard to interact with for kids with physical disabilities.
- There are a lot of parks in the neighbourhood for young families including the one across the street from this spot. It would be nice to have a space geared more to dog owners and adults.
- It would be a delight to have affordable housing but parks are needed more than low cost housing. Maybe when I get evicted I can sleep in the new park on the East Mall!
- This would be a good place for a park for seniors. There is a public family park at East Mall and Rathbun and condos should have their own playgrounds, splash pads. It is very close to busy intersection for small children. Don't let it be a student hang-out (garbage, illegal activity, graffiti). Keep it a natural oasis for adults, seniors. Have a place for musical performances.
- why are there so many paved areas in a PARK? given the park's relatively diminutive size, I would expect a greater emphasis on actual green space
- No comments
- Just wanted to share about the hwy noise that might be very annoying to some people.
- Would like more grass/green space to sit for picnics
- What is ruling for pets (dogs)?
- It is critical that the space is not take. Over by dog walkers with their dogs which would make the surfaces, including the grass area unusable for children. The priority must be families, children and adults and not a place for dog walking. If this is not co trolled the park will be unusable
- There is already a beautiful nearby splash pad on East Mall, so I don't think another one is necessary and I would love to see more grass.
- Outdoor skating in winter
- There's no food or beverage stands?
- I like the wood trellis as a shade structure. I love the incorporated woods that add a more natural look to the decor of the park.
- Don't see the pollinator garden you mentioned. A large swath (3-4' across, the length of the park) planted with native plants, mostly perennial, it would need to receive adequate sun. Could the paving on the south side be replaced by such a garden. It could also work its way up somewhat on the east and the west sides.

Use of more natural materials in structures would be nice rather than plastic and aluminum. While these materials may be considered more durable they are not pleasing aesthetically.

- Consider the ease of maintenance when selecting features. Consider potential impacts related to the probable use by Bloorlea Middle School students.
- It is difficult to understand the scale of the maps/drawings. There should be a scale provided to understand sizes of areas and proportional relationships of areas
- There are lots of outdoor fitness areas in the parks in the neighbourhood but nothing like ping-pong tables. Please consider that.
- Is only seating available around tables. What about benches or separate seats such as Muslims chairs.

- I believe that a children's zone is not necessary there is a large water park/playground just 500m North - and Bloorlea school as well... give the adults the space
- The exercise area and playground are too close together. I'd prefer to exercise in peace without children screaming around me. I would rather a pull-up bar than monkey bars as monkey bars will just attract young children to the space which is more targeted for adults.
- There is a splash pad just a few hundred metres from here. I don't think another is needed. It would be nice to have a park where adults and seniors feel welcome. Splash pad parks bring families who stay an entire day
- Where is the enclosed space for dogs? This is very much lacking in the Etobicoke area. Residents complain about dogs yet there is no place to take your dog. Perhaps that could be included here?
- Sound wall for traffic on Bloor street.
- Any small coffee shop(snacks/popsicle/water) and the most important, washrooms? Thank you
- It is very close to the road so fences should be a major aspect of the design. The roads and highway are loud and children might run out onto the road. Also the plot of land is very small and having a lot of things condensed into a small place is quite a turn off. I won't be able to use the game tables with children screaming.
- The whole thing is STUPID. traffic in the area is already a nightmare. Someone is going to get killed by a speeding car as they are coming or going from the park. Not to mention it is LOUD. right next to the 427. Are you nuts. The planners need to get their heads
- Not too much sand...a problem to keep poop free
- There is a park nearby (on east mall) with a splash pad and playground so it would be nice to have something different :)
- More seating scattered throughout near splash pad, play areas etc. Parents like to sit near where children are playing not far away in centralized area.
- I dont agree that splashpad or playground is needed when there is a park almost across street that already has those!
- I would have liked to have seen a fenced off leash dog park. Many residents in the area have been wanting a fenced off leash dog park for over a decade. It is

disappointing that this has not happened in Etobicoke while we have seen such parks crop up throughout the GTA.

- The intersection of Bloor W and the East Mall has a significant amount of traffic. I have concerns with respect to activities too close to the roadways for smaller children. The parkette might be too small for all the activities proposed.
- Although happy for mixed use there is another splash pad very near and play equipment for children so would like to see a new space that caters to older people as well. Somewhere that has lots of planting for insects and birds.
- I'd like to see an adequate number of benches throughout the park for resting spots.
- Park should be bigger.
- I am worried that it will be too noisy with cars and the brutal traffic all the new buildings will create, and families won't want to bring kids. I then worry about this being more of a hangout for drug dealers and vagrants than a playground.
- Should be a park for both adults and families to go for walk, spend quality time No need for splash pads or activities, to many parks in the area with all that stuff that attracts hang outs for teenagers and noisy kids and parents in splash parks also create garbage. Considering it's a very close to the buildings people living there will not be able to have any quietness threw the hot months when they have the high way already to deal with ! Very happy as a residential owner in the area for over 30 years that there will be something nice to look at and be able to walk to and sit enjoying the neighborhood
- Safety is my main concern. Being quite close to a busy intersection is a little worrisome. Another consideration is the school across the street people use the basketball nets their for fitness (not to duplicate efforts). In my experience outdoor fitness equipment in parks (step benches and pull up bars) aren't used often
- I just wish it was at the corner of East Mall and Gibbs Road, instead of East Mall and Bloor, to reduce the feeling of being on a busy road.
- Outdoor lights for evenings
- One of the most amazing parks in the entire GTA is the 'Castle Park' at High Park which is a complete wooden structure and very highly utilized by many families in the GTA. Why have you not considered such a beautiful design instead of these newer plastic designs? Sand is never good as cats and dogs use this as a litter box and kids always bring the sand home in their shoes! Please use wood chips or rubber only! Please! I am so grateful you are putting a park here! Maybe there is room for food trucks or ice cream trucks and you can give them access to this space on the road.
- Should have fencing surrounding all children play areas
- A combo of the 2 seating options. Combo of the 2 play options: rocks, slide & spinner from option 1 and Bloq4 climber & Hedra Scout from option 2. It would be nice if the fence was stylish rather than just a chain link. Plenty of water fountains / falls (not just a few) to play under. Nice flowers. It doesn't look like there is parking. Would we be able to park at the school?

- It would be great if the concrete pad in the middle with splash pads can be considered/designed for skating in the winter months. This will increase the utility of the space during winter months
- There is already a splash pad and playground area north at East Mall and Valhalla Inn Road at East Mall Park less than 10min away. this design priorities more infrastructure for children at the expense of many pet owners in the area that could also use space. there is no nearby dog park and this area would be the perfect place for such infrastructure. This park design should consider that the area is already underserved as far as per infrastructure goes, and that there already existing children's playground areas nearby. consideration for a dog recreation area would ve appropriate.
- Having a water park and playground is redundant, given East Mall Park already have these functions and is less than 5 minutes walking distance
- I want a dog park
- A jogging track on the periphery would be great
- This looks pretty small I would like to see larger space here
