Spring Garden Park Playground Improvements



Survey Summary Report

May 2022

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Project Background

Spring Garden Park is a small park located at 32 Meadow Crest Road, west of Mimico Creek in the Sunnylea neighbourhood. The playground can be accessed by Springbrook Gardens to the north and Meadow Crest Road to the south. The playground currently includes:

- One swing set
- One small slide
- One domed climber
- One bench

The playground will be redesigned using feedback from the community. The redesigned playground is proposed to include:

- A full playground redevelopment including accessible play equipment
- An accessible pathway connecting to the new playground area
- New accessible playground safety surfacing
- New accessible seating

Survey Overview

An online survey was available from April 22 to May 8, 2022. The survey asked the community for feedback on four design options for the playground improvements. The survey also included questions on the playground colours, playground surface and seating. An open ended question allowed respondents to provide general and specific feedback about the playground improvements.

The survey received a **total of 396 submissions**. Some submissions included feedback from multiple people (e.g. entire households). In total, **897 people** of various ages participated in the survey responses collected.

The feedback collected will help the project team identify priorities for the playground design.

- **When asked to rank the playground design options**
 - 35% preferred Design A
 - 27% preferred Design B
 - 21% preferred Design D
 - 17% preferred Design C
- **The three most important features to include in the playground are:**
 - Climbing structure (54%)
 - Senior play structure for ages 5 to 12 (53%)
 - Other comments (27%) such as climbing structures, adding softscape, adding waterplay and having equipment suitable for older children/teens.
- **The three least important features to include in the playground are:**
 - Play panels (42%)
 - Spring toys (32%)
 - Slide with bump features (30%)
- Budget permitting, the top three features respondents would like more are:
 - Climbing structures (47%)
 - Senior play structure for ages 5 to 12 (35%)
 - Belt swings (22%)
- **58% of respondents prefer earthy colours like green, brown and grey for the playground equipment**
- **44% of respondents prefer a rubber playground surface**

- **The majority of respondents (79%) have access to private outdoor space like a yard**
 - 10% of respondents preferred not to answer
 - 6% of respondents only have access to public spaces like parks
 - 5% of respondents have access to semi-private/shared outdoor space
- **A majority of respondents (81%) identified as homeowners**
 - 7% of respondents prefer not to answer
 - 6% of respondents are renters



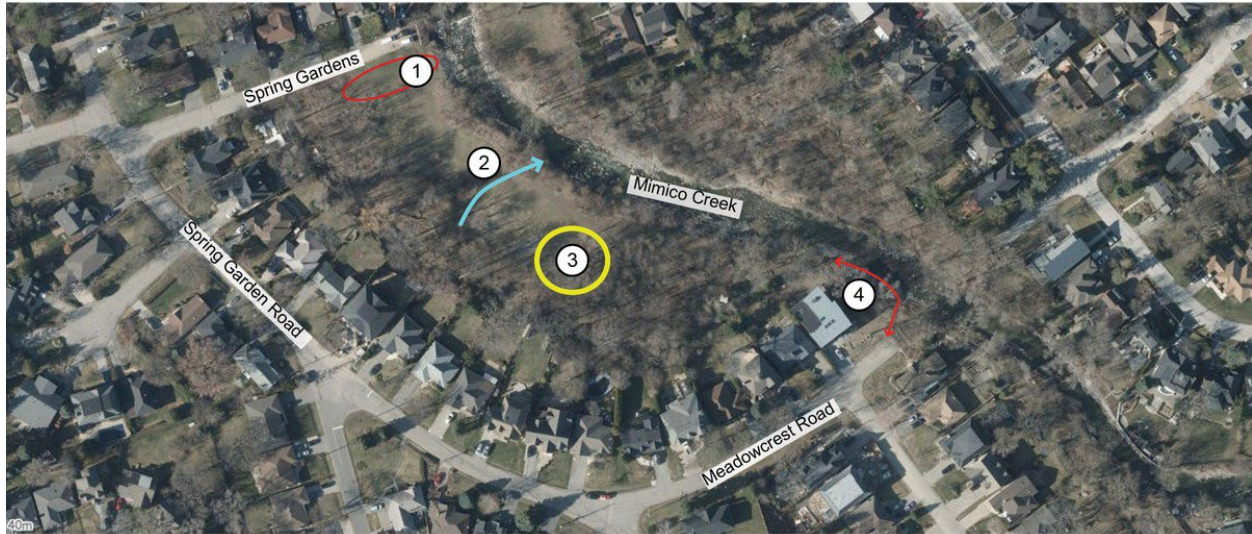

Appendix B: Proposed Layout and Design Options

The Park Layout Today

The existing playground is located at the south end of Spring Garden Park. Sightlines to the playground from the street are limited, which impacts safety. Existing grass slopes and swale (shallow marshy ditch-like areas) means that there currently is no accessible route to the playground.

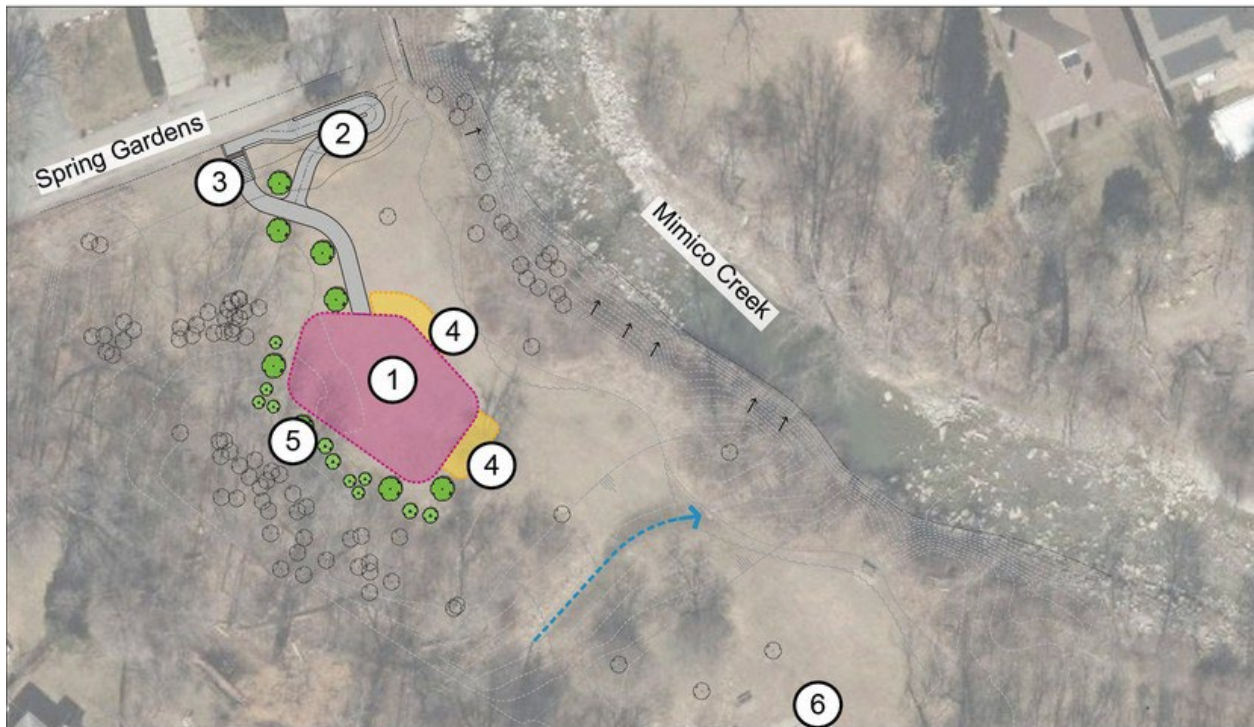


1. Grass slope

Proposed Playground Layout

The new playground will be relocated closer to Springbrook Gardens and connectivity will be improved through an accessible ramp, stairs and walkway from Springbrook Gardens. The layout also includes:

- New native trees along the walkway from Springbrook Gardens to the playground area
- Preservation of existing trees and natural buffer around playground
- New seating areas beside the playground area

Appendix C: Text Responses

Do you have any additional feedback about the improvements coming to Spring Garden Park?

- Thank you for this opportunity to share our thoughts. As homeowners of [REDACTED] we are the closest homeowners by proximity to the park. We are aware of the petition against all development but it's important to note that the creator and bulk of signatories are dog owners who use the park as leash-free space for which it is not designated. I can also confirm that a number of the signatories no longer or never did live here. Our colour preference is green, brown, neutral tones.
- Looks good and makes sense to move it closer to the street. I would want the little bushland to the south and the rough bank of the creek retained. The kids love to 'explore', yet it's easy to keep track of them.
- Formalize access from Meadowcrest road and address the daily coyote sightings in that area as well as provide access to van Dusen bridge along the creek
- Thank you for reviving this park. The current play set has been neglected and the location of the existing structure lends itself to being used as a place to drink. We routinely find broken glass at this structure. It would be great to include a bridge / path over the marsh for those that want to walk and explore the nature.
- I strongly oppose and playground structure. The natural green space as is is wonderful for peaceful enjoyment of nature and wild life (deer, coyotes, fox...) would love to leave this park left undeveloped. Waste of taxpayers dollars to build another elaborate playground when there are several playgrounds in the area that are under utilized. Please do not build a play structure, just remove the outdated equipment that never gets used. People of all ages enjoy this natural setting.
- I do not want a playground across the street from my home. There is already too much congestion. There is no where for cars to park except on the road, which they end up blocking access to our driveways, Please keep the area as is minus the existing play set. It is nice to have a natural wooded area in this part of the neighbourhood. There is land across the creek where you can put a playground. Please leave nature, as is. Thank you for your time.
- Wooden structures, like in Humbertown park or June Rowland's park are very good for kids. I also think you should consider musical instruments like xylophones to be added. Parks with musical features strike me as educationally effective for both older and younger children.
- We do not want a playground! The residents of Springbrook do not want a playground or an upgraded playground. Remove the structures completely and keep the natural greenspace. There is only 1 person who requested this change. No one else wants it and its bias to put in your survey no option for us to click that we do not want the playground. You're aware there is a petition circulating that we are all against the upgrades to the park and we will fight this legally if we have to.

- What a total waste of money and ignorance of what the community wants or needs! There are already 2 beautiful, fully accessible playgrounds located within a 3 min walk of this location. The area is unbearably mosquito-infested in the summer, and unfortunately inhabited by partying teenagers at night who will deface and destroy whatever you put up within a matter of minutes. The area would be far better served as an off-leash dog park or a pickleball court. *I'm forced to rank, in order to continue survey
- Not sure about the spinner chairs in option A as they have been vandalized at Fairfield Park in the past. Could there be any motion lighting? Will the paths and stairs be accessible in winter to get to the playground?
- No playground is needed in this park! We need to preserve the rapidly disappearing green space instead.
- No Playground - preserve the greenspace. For reasons outlined in the petition (change.org/SpringGardenPark) already shared with Mark Grimes and the City (Tonya Crawford and Mark Goulart) signed by over 150 residents and growing. We would like to preserve this greenspace and do NOT want a playground. There are two large modern playgrounds within a 5min walk of this location (Fairfield Park and Lorahill Park) as well as a few other playgrounds within 1 km of this location (including Tom Riley and Norseman).
- Please have lots of benches and seating areas.
- Zip line
- I live on this street. I do not want a park and the foot traffic / garbage it will bring. There are other parks very close by this should instead be maintained as a green space and the city should plant flowers and more trees to replace those cut down due to the nettle infestation. Shouldn't the city be required to follow its own tree ratio rules when a tree is removed?? Isn't it 7 trees per one removed?. I think another play structure is a huge waste of funds. Plant trees instead.
- A sandbox is always very popular with kids 1-6 years
- No playground is needed. There are other playgrounds VERY close. Waste of taxpayer money !
- Less equipment, more nature. Add benches to enjoy the nature
- We do NOT want a playground structure. Please disregard my design selection as I was not able to provide comments without a selection. My kids and I have always appreciated this natural park. When the kids want to go to a playground we go to Lorahill or Fairfield another playground is NOT needed. Love this natural park, it's like a bit of cottage country in the city. Kids enjoy the open space, exploring and using their imagination. City should NOT use taxpayers dollars for an unneeded playground.
- Strong preference is No playground. I love the natural green space and do not want to see a new play structure. Removal of the old play structure would be great but please maintain the current fabulous unique wilderness in the park. I love this hidden gem in the city and would hate to see a playground take away from our enjoyment of this space.
- Appreciate the improvements and like the new plan

- I believe the current informal path to the south is blocked off so if it's possible to make more formal paths along the river to walk that would be nice. Same comment/desire to the north but obviously not in the scope of this project.
- don't put a playground, leave it natural
- As a 20 year resident in the neighbourhood with 3 children, what we love about this space is the discovery of a natural setting along the creek. I vote to leave the space and only add native species trees and any other natural habitat. The area has 2 great playgrounds which the residents fought so hard to preserve and build. Give the money to another park in an area of need.
- No playground preserve the green space. Why is there not an option to choose no design
- This park is very isolated, it needs to have safely features
- Love all the ideas. It will make the space more usable and attract families.
- this is 'the secret park' and kids enjoy the wild aspect of this hidden park. I don't actually want any of the generic plastic designs that are in every other park, including 2 that are VERY close to this one. Why not do something creative and unique?
- With two parks nearby, the city could better invest this money into rejuvenating the area, leaving it natural, and creating a space for dogs to be able to run and play.
- I am glad to see an accessible playground option being planned in our neighbourhood. I'm frustrated with the community members who are lobbying to keep the space 'as is,' because it shows no consideration for the fact that it currently cannot be used/enjoyed by people with disabilities, who have as much right to this space as anyone else.
- The best option is NO PLAYGROUND. Do not waste anymore money on something we do not need nor want
- There are 2 extensive playgrounds less than 5 minutes walk away from this park plus one scheduled for upgrades in Tom Riley park. It is important to leave some areas wild and unbuilt so children can explore and use their imagination to create games. In this particular area, children and their parents/grandparents have easy access to 3 playgrounds AND they have sizeable backyards. How about using these funds to create playgrounds and parks in parts of the city where there are none.
- Please preserve this green space and do not build this playground. There are plenty literally five mins away.
- Since this park is so close to Mimico Creek, was there a consideration of leaving it as simply a natural area without equipment? I have lived in the area for 13 years and I have rarely seen anyone using the park.
- There are 3 other lovely play structures within .5 km if this space. Why not create a nature reserve space? Or an off-leash dog space? Neither exist anywhere nearby.
- I do NOT want to see a playground built here. (Option selected only because unable to provide feedback without a selection). I've enjoyed this parkland as is my entire life. The equipment there can be removed but leave the rest of the park as is. Wildlife can frequently be spotted here including deer and lots of coyotes.

I live very close to this park and I know that there is a lot of room for a zip line. People also need dog parks. There are not enough enclosed areas for dogs to run free off leash.
