Recent increase in overdose deaths in Toronto

Why are we sending this alert?

- Preliminary data from Toronto Paramedic Services shows that from July 17th-21st, 2022, there were 10 suspected opioid overdose-related deaths. Including these deaths, a total of 21 suspected opioid overdose-related deaths have been reported so far for the month of July.
- There appears to be a potential increase in deaths from **smoking opioids and stimulants**.

Additional Information

- A range of drugs were involved in this increase in overdose fatalities.
- Fentanyl continues to show up in the local drug supply in a variety of colours with unpredictable potency and contamination.
- <u>Toronto's Drug Checking Service</u> has recently found <u>higher amounts</u> of fentanyl in fentanyl substances and potential evidence of crack cocaine being contaminated with fentanyl. A sample submitted as used crack cocaine equipment was found to contain cocaine, fentanyl, and caffeine; this equipment was reported not to have been reused.
- According to Toronto Paramedic Services reports, drug inhalation equipment, such as pipes, were present on scene in a number of the overdose deaths.
- Overdoses are occurring in a variety of neighbourhoods across the city.

Messages for people using drugs in Toronto:

- **Try not to use alone.** Buddy up with someone who you trust. Have a drug use safety plan and keep naloxone on-hand.
- Use a supervised consumption service, if possible. For locations and hours of sites please visit: toronto.ca/ConsumptionServices.
- If you must use alone, have a safety plan.
 - Get someone to check on you either by phone or in person.
 - Consider calling the National Overdose Response Service at 1-888-688-NORS (6677) to get support while using alone.
 - Connect to community members virtually via the Brave app.
- Vet your supply. Ask others about what they are experiencing with the same drug or batch.
- Check what's in your drugs at local drug checking services. Your drugs might have unexpected substances in them. Have them checked at one of the drug checking service locations in <u>Toronto</u>.
- **Get naloxone**. Kits are available at Toronto Public Health, The Works, and through many <u>partner</u> <u>organizations</u>. Free naloxone kits are also available at some pharmacies. Visit <u>www.ontario.ca/page/get-naloxone-kits-free</u> or call 1-800-565-8603.

If someone looks like they are overdosing on opioids, give naloxone and call 911. Follow the <u>5-Step Response</u> to opioid overdose.

- Know what you're smoking get your drugs checked before using.
- Pace yourself take breaks as you go.
- Buddy up use with someone you trust who can help if you go down.
- Keep naloxone close at hand.
