Introduction

The Update Downsview Study is reimagining the future of the Downsview area and creating a new framework to guide change. To this end, the Project Team presented its first <u>Staff Report</u> to the May 31st Planning and Housing Committee, which outlined 17 Emerging Directions, and initiated the associated Environmental Assessment Study in April.

To begin Phase 2 of the Study, the Project Team delivered a number of public engagement activities, centered around the week of June 20th to 25th, to obtain feedback on the Emerging Directions and the Environmental Assessment Study, as well as additional input to consider as the Update Downsview Study progresses. The public engagement activities also provided information on the Official Plan Amendment (OPA) application submitted by Northcrest Developments and Canada Lands Company (CLC) (the Landowners) as well as the Taxiway West district application submitted by Northcrest Developments. The purpose of this **'What We Heard Report'** is to provide an overview of the public consultation activities and summarize the input received. The 'What We Heard Report' (WWH Report) consists of three parts (separate PDFs):

- > WWH Report Part 1: Downsview Public Library Pop-Up
- > WWH Report Part 2: Survey & Off-Site Pop-Ups
- > WWH Report Part 3: Virtual Public Meeting & Public Correspondence

This document (WWH Part 2) will focus on the input received through informal off-site pop-ups within the community throughout the week.

High Level Key Themes

The following is a high level summary of the key themes we heard through public input, across all of our activities:

- > Need for more housing options, including affordable housing;
- > Concern about proposed intensity of development and increased traffic congestion;
- > Need for improved pedestrian, cycling and transit infrastructure;
- > Need to address existing traffic issues, including through better connectivity;
- Desire for a wide range of additional community services and facilities, including parks and open spaces;
- > Importance of achieving equitable economic development objectives;
- > Interest in additional programming and events in the area, particularly related to children/youth and celebrating cultural diversity; and,
- > Ensuring access to retail and jobs through new development.



Overview

Part 2: Survey & Off-Site Pop-Ups of the **What We Heard Report** provides an overview of the off-site pop-up locations visited by City Staff as well as survey questions asked and a summary of responses received from residents, workers, and business representatives. The survey questions and responses are organized by topic, which includes: general, mobility, built form and land use, environment & parks and open space, inclusive social and economic development, as well as additional comments.





Survey & Informal Off-Site Pop-Ups

In addition to being at the main Pop-Up location at Downsview Public Library, members of the Project Team made additional engagement efforts by approaching library users and visiting other locations in the Downsview area throughout the week of Monday, June 20th to Saturday, June 25th, 2022. Input from these additional activities was recorded through the survey sheets. The survey questions were aligned with the prompting questions displayed on the information boards at the library Pop-Up. Over 200 people were engaged with in-person throughout the week at the Downsview Public Library Pop-Up as well as through informal off-site Pop-Ups. The Project Team visited the following locations:

- Downsview Memorial Parkette/ intersection of Keele and Wilson;
- Downsview Park Merchants Market & Farmers Market;

- > Stanley Greene Park;
- > Ancaster Park;
- > Wilson Subway Station;

- > Black Creek Library; and,
- > Downsview Shopping Centre.

To date, the survey has been completed by over 100 respondents, including residents, workers, and business representatives. To continue obtaining feedback, the survey will be available on the <u>webpage</u> until the end of 2022.

The below provides a summary of the responses received to each question. *Note: the survey responses are not intended to total 100% as not all respondents answered all questions and respondents were able to select multiple answers for many of the questions.*

General

- **25%** Regular information and updates in the form of meetings, newsletters, open houses, surveys, site walks, social media.
- **14%** Deliberate and targeted engagement of Black and Indigenous communities throughout all phases.
- **17%** A (volunteer based) diverse advisory group to inform the redevelopment.
- **12%** A community ambassador team working locally to deliver information and obtain input.
- **17%** Hiring locally (when possible).
- **14%** Other.

- > Access for pets, bikes, and cars;
- Outdoor pool, water fountains, hammocks, fire pit, shaded picnic tables, outdoor chess tables, exercise area, splash pad;
- > Space for cultural diversity;
- > Outdoor areas to charge devices;
- Better drainage and grading (e.g. excess water from Wilson Heights, causes flooding);

- Wider sidewalks and bike lanes, frequent pedestrian crossings;
- Better cleaning and snow removal in parks and sidewalks, as well as garbage maintenance;
- Sustainable parks, native plants and trees;
- Trails, green/open space, gardens, wildlife; and,

- > Skating rink/trail, opportunities to play;
- > Christmas market and winter trail;
- Gumball rally (high end cars), car displays;
- > Tear up runway and make a giant field until construction; and,
- > Community centre and retail use.



Inclusive Social and Economic Development:

What existing programs/services do you use within or surrounding the Downsview Area? What gaps exist?

- Use community centre and after school > programs, skating rink and library;
- Need community centre with indoor swimming pool, indoor track/exercise room;
- > Need connections to bike trails;
- > TTC, health care;
- Need more infant and toddler programs, activities for children such as sports/recreation, tutoring, drop-in and arts and crafts programs;

- Need shelters, financial service programs and supports to find housing;
- > Co-working space, local hiring;
- Not enough parks, park snack bars, libraries, amenity/green space, splash pads, playgrounds or recreation spaces; and,
- Photography and videography studio, collaboration spaces.

What cultural spaces and/or events would you like to see in the Downsview Area?

- Events/festivals (e.g. food, social, music, charity, writers, culture, kite flying, carnival, outdoor movie night, wellness);
- Cultural events: Spanish festival, Jamaica Day, Afro Fest, Taste of Manila, Hispanic, Garba (Indian festival);
- > Indigenous peoples culture;
- Black female welcoming spaces/events;
- Community spaces/events with welcoming atmosphere and diversity, gathering and learning space for various ethnicities;

- > Farms and food resilience history;
- Mix of old and young, more space for younger people, allowing for spontaneous events;
- Concert venues, night clubs, theatres, performing arts centre;
- Mosque;
- > Pedestrian only streets;
- Education about wildlife, local Downsview history;
- > Commercial uses; and,
- > Motor vehicle racing.

How do you think the area's cultural heritage can be preserved/celebrated?

- > Planting native plants, trees;
- > Pavilions covered in art;
- > Celebrating diversity, especially Black and Indigenous people; and,
- More cultural events, multicultural flags and symbols, multi-language signs;
- An annual event and educational events;
- > Theatres stage or musical;



- An aeronautics museum, tribute to the runway, airplanes, and Bombardier;
- Maintain existing heritage buildings, allow locals to own/use cultural spaces.

- > Hire within/locally to employ residents;
- Dedicated diverse employment opportunities;
- More businesses and jobs, including construction and retail jobs, agricultural, manufacturing, warehouse and distribution, textiles, IT hubs, biotech, apprenticeship opportunities;
- Business that are sustainable, locally owned;

- Improved access to jobs and transportation;
- Introducing more amenities to support lower income families;
- > Extended business hours; and,
- A dedicated core is good for businesses, more shopping closer to residents.

What are the existing employment services you use? What gaps exist? What types of businesses are important to create employment opportunities in Downsview?

- Need more/ accessible employment support for veterans, youth and newcomers;
- Need literacy/language programs, educational programs, job matching;
- Education tools for personal support work, nutrition, social entrepreneurship, pregnancy/ infant care;

Create jobs through development, new entertainment services, small businesses, retail stores, high tech and industrial:

- More equitable opportunities for Black > people, including skills training, apprenticeships, community benefits;
- Offer low rents to encourage tech and > film companies; and,
- STEM programs for kids. >

- Concern with poverty, should consult people living on the street and young people locked out of the housing market;
- > Preserve cultural heritage;
- Prioritize housing affordability, access to housing;
- Need better flow to/from the parking lot at the Downsview Market;
- Modernize Downsview Market with WiFi, better HVAC and health & safety, parking – there is a shortage of flea markets;
- Good location for disaster/ emergency centres;
- Fruit trees in public spaces, street art; and,
- Concerned with more roads built in Downsview area.
