New Park at 4000 Eglinton Avenue West

Phase 1: Concept Design Options Survey Summary Report

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Project Background

A new park is coming to 4000 Eglinton Avenue West!

There will be a new 2,756 square metre public park as part of a mixed-use development project located near Eglinton Avenue West and Royal York Road, in the Humber Heights-Westmount neighbourhood. This project is in the early design phase and will be further developed using the survey results and feedback received during the community engagement process.

Two Concept Designs

Concept designs are prepared at an early phase of the design process, and are intended to outline the proposed design elements and layout of a space. There are two concept design options the project team is looking for feedback on for the new park at 4000 Eglinton Avenue West. The feedback from this survey will help confirm priorities when developing a Preferred Design.

Option A includes:

- Pedestrian connections at the south-west, south-east, and north-east corners
- A playground adjacent to a plaza with a shade canopy
- South of the playground, a games area with game tables and ping pong tables
- A basketball court, located west of the plaza
 - The Parks and Recreation Facilities Master Plan (FMP) identifies basketball as a programming recommendation in this ward.
- New plants and native plant species

Option B includes:

- Pedestrian connections at the south-west, south-east, and north-east corners
- A playground and fitness station is located on the east side
- A centrally located Plaza with shade canopy, game tables and ping pong tables
- The design includes seating areas along the walkways
- New plants and native plant species
- Walking loop located in the west side of the park

Project Timeline

The anticipated timeline for this park project is as follows:

- April 2022: Hire a design team
- Summer to Winter 2022: Community engagement
- 2023 to 2024: Design development and detailed design
- Summer 2024: Hire a construction team
- Fall 2024: Construction starts
- Spring 2025: Construction complete

Note: The timeline is subject to change.

How We Reached People

In general, the community was informed of engagement activities through social and print media, listed below:

Print Media

Flyers

Printed flyers were distributed to local community groups and posted near the park site. These flyers provided information about the project, details about the online survey, and how to access additional information on the project webpage.

Digital Media

Project Webpage

A webpage (<u>toronto.ca/4000EglintonAvenueWest</u>) was set up to act as a communications portal to inform the public about the new park project. The webpage hosts all up to date information regarding the project, including links to the online survey and a sign-up button for e-updates.

Online Survey

In October 2022, the project team launched an online survey to collect feedback on the proposed design for the new park. Responses to the survey will help to generate ideas, and confirm priorities for a Preferred Design of the park.

The survey had three components:

- Design Options allowing participants to indicate their level of agreement or disagreement with a series of statements about the elements in each design option. Participants could also provide their overall design preference between the two design options.
- Playground Equipment allowing participants to rate their preferences for the playground equipment theme and feature options.
- Participant Demographics and Follow Up this section asks about who is filling out the survey, to help us understand who it reached and whose feedback we may be missing.

The online survey was available from October 13 to October 31, 2022. The survey received a **total of 441 responses**. A full look at the survey results can be found in Appendix A.

Survey Respondents

- The survey received a total of **441 survey responses**.
 - The majority of survey participants were in the 30 to 39 years old (30%),
 40 to 55 years old (28%), 19 to 29 years old (13%), and 56 to 64 years old (13%) age categories, respectively.
- The majority of respondents found out about the survey from social media (66%)
- About half of respondents have access to private outdoor space like a yard (40%) and 31% only have access to public spaces like parks
 - o 19% of respondents have access to semi-private/shared outdoor space
 - 10% of respondents preferred not to answer
- More than half of respondents identified as homeowners (59%) and 23% as renters
 - 10% preferred not to answer
 - 8% of respondents identified as permanently living with parent(s) or other family member(s)
- 7% of respondents identified as a person with a disability
 - o 81% of respondents did not identify as a person with a disability
 - 11% of respondents preferred not to answer
 - 1% of respondents don't know

Option A

Overall Preferred Option

When asked to provide an overall preferred option, **the majority of respondents (71%) preferred Design Option B**, compared to 26% of respondents who preferred Design Option A, and 3% of respondents who didn't know/preferred not to answer.

Playground Equipment

The survey provided demonstrative images of two playground themes, and asked respondents to select their preferred playground theme:

- The majority of respondents prefer a traditional playground theme (53%),
- 39% prefer a geometric playground theme
- 8% don't know/prefer not to answer.

The most popular play equipment features respondents would like to see at the playground are (respondents could select up to 4 options):

- Slide (85%)
- Climbing wall (55%)
- Playhouse (50%)
- Overhead climbing feature (i.e. monkey bars) (50%)
- Teeter-totter (33%)
- Disc swing (28%)
- Group spinner (i.e. merry-go-round) (25%)
- Play panel (23%)
- Spring toy (10%)
- Freestanding spinner (8%)

Who did we hear from?


Participants were asked to provide demographic information. This helps the City better understand who participated and whether particular groups in the community were missed during the engagement process.
