TransformTO Net Zero Strategy

A climate action pathway to 2030 and beyond

November 2021

- The Net Zero Strategy proposes a 45 percent reduction in community-wide greenhouse gas emissions by 2025, from 1990 levels; and net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2040.
- The Strategy names targets and actions for:
 - Buildings
 - Energy
 - Transportation
 - Sustainable consumption and waste
 - Greenspace
 - Decision-making and equitable engagement.

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Action #15: Continue to pursue policy and programmatic interventions that help the City reach its aspirational goals of **zero waste** and a **circular economy**, and which identify pathways to **more sustainable consumption** in both municipal operations and in all sectors of the economy

- a) Develop a City-wide governance structure, strategy and policy framework to establish a path to make the City the first municipality in the Province of Ontario with a **circular economy** and to align with the Provincial goal as part of the *Waste Free Ontario Act*
- b) Conduct a **consumption based emissions inventory** and identify targets that would meaningfully reduce consumption based emissions
- c) Enable Torontonians to reduce waste and engage in sustainable consumption by implementing the **Single Use and Takeaway Items Reduction Strategy**
