- How did you reach out to other people about proposing a commemorative name for this property?
- Does the proposal have the support of those who will use or visit this property? Who else supports this proposal? Who does not support this proposal (if applicable)?

*Equity-deserving groups include racialized people; newcomers; persons with disabilities; women; youth; persons with low income; and Two-Spirit, lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, queer+ communities. Examples of racialized people include East Asian, South Asian, Southeast Asian, West Asian, Indo-Caribbean, Arab, Middle Eastern, Latin American. Examples of newcomers include immigrants and refugees who have recently arrived in Toronto, refugee claimants, temporary residents, and undocumented persons.
