Land Acknowledgement



Guiding Park Improvements for the next 20 years



What is the Centennial Park Master Plan?

The **Centennial Park Master Plan** is a dynamic and long-term planning document that guides decision making for park improvements and management over the next 20 years.

Master Plan topics include:

- 1. Park Programming & Recreation
- 2. Water and Ecology
- 3. Accessibility and Movement
- 4. Art and Placemaking





Centennial Park Master Plan Vision



Centennial Park is envisioned as a welcoming, inclusive, safe and walkable open space that balances recreational activity with the park's natural features. Enhanced community accessibility and ecological connections will provide visitors with improved access to nature, recreation, park programs, land stewardship and educational opportunities year-round.



Guiding Principles

The Master Plan is steered by four guiding principles. These four principles inform the future park improvements and programming:

1. Activate

 Centennial Park should be an active, safe and inclusive space for all to enjoy across the seasons. The park should strengthen the vitality of communities and support the diverse needs and interests of Toronto's residents and visitors. New facilities should be multi-purpose and multi-age.

2. Connect

 Centennial Park should be strongly linked to its community and enable all visitors to enjoy all the park's features through accessible, pedestrian-centered design. It should be a place that connects people to each other, to the land, and to local history.





Guiding Principles


The Master Plan is steered by four guiding principles. These four principles inform the future park improvements and programming:

3. Protect and Enhance

 Centennial Park should promote the preservation, rehabilitation and restoration of natural systems throughout the park to support greater biodiversity, as well as enhance its cultural and recreational uses.

4. Collaborate and Evolve

 Centennial Park should foster partnerships that bring together a diverse community of neighbours and citizens to celebrate the area's layered histories. Centennial Park should evolve over time to serve and empower the community that uses and lives around the park.

1. Centennial Hill Re-Imagined: Skate Trail, Hill Trail, Chalet, and Parking Lot Improvements



Skate Trail Improvements:

- New artificial ice skating trail including changeroom facility in the chalet
- Design: 2023 Construction: 2024

Hill Trail Improvements:

- Accessible Pathways/Trails including the lookout nodes
- Design: 2023/24 Construction: 2024/25



1. Centennial Hill Re-Imagined: Skate Trail, Hill Trail, Chalet, and Parking Lot Improvements



Parking Lot Improvements

- State of good repair work to parking lots 1-5 including storm water management system
- Design: 2023/24 Construction: 2024/25





2. Heart of the Park - District Playgrou

A new Destination Playground and Water Play Area, in a unified space celebrating the nearby natural environment.

This will include:

- New playground and water play area
- Social gathering spaces and picnicking opportunities
- Indigenous Placekeeping
- Accessibility improvements and inclusive play
- Parking lot and pathway improvements

Design 2022/23 - Construction 2023/2







3. Proposed FIFA Training Facility, Sport Hubs, and Recreational Facilities

Three Phases of Sport Improvements

Phase 1 New Baseball Hub

- Reclaiming Mini Indy back to park use
- Includes new lighting
- Design 2023 Construction 2024

Phase 2 New Soccer Hub


(Proposed FIFA Training Facility)

- Removal of eastern baseball diamonds
- New turf, irrigation, and lighting
- Design 2023 Construction 2025

Phase 3 Multi-Use Sport Courts

- Basketball and pickleball
- Design 2023/24 Construction 2026/27








4. Skateboard Park

A new district-scale skate park that will include:

- Combinations of ramps, rails, bowls, and steps
- Variations of obstacles scales for varying skill levels
- Opportunities for recreational programming

Design 2026 – Construction 2027/28





5. Stadium Bubble



5. Stadium Bubble

An air supported structure will be installed to allow year-round use of the existing artificial turf sport field within the stadium.

This will include new supporting infrastructure (e.g. grade beam footing and pressurizing mechanical facility).

Feasibility Review: 2023

Design*: 2024/2025

Construction*: 2027/28

*Require a positive feasibility review.





6. Multi-Use Trail Program




6. Multi-Use Trail Program

Grade and surface improvements will be made to the interior arterial pathways. These improvements include:

- New Multi-use Trail along Centennial Park Blvd. from Eglinton Ave to Rathburn Rd.
- New park gateway entrances and wayfinding

Design: 2023 – Construction*: 2023-2025

*Construction to be coordinated with other projects' phasing.

New Cricket Pitch

Repurposing the existing soccer pitch near Eglinton Ave.
