





Previous Open House + Survey

What we heard



Safety needs to be a priority

Consider whether you would take your kids to the park and whether you would take them at night

The built environment + programming can increase safety

Evening activities would be good for safety. Lighting needs to be taken into consideration. Public art, better lighting on Jarvis to draw people into the park.

Consider the needs and experiences of unhoused people

Survey respondents felt strongly that people experiencing homelessness need to be a priority for this project. They were concerned about their displacement and the interruption to accessing services. . .they also felt there needed to be meaningful support provided to ensure that the park is accessible to all community members.

Centre the history of the space

Participants were interested in an opportunity to educate the public about the history of Moss Park. This includes acknowledging all parts of its history, as well as considering a name change. This presents a possible opportunity to celebrate and share information about the Indigenous history and character of Moss Park.

Accessible space for all

Members of the public were interested in increasing efforts towards environmental protection in Moss Park. They felt that natural materials should be used to build the park and that the park should integrate technology that supports clean energy.



Incorporate Indigenous art into the design of fencing or having seating areas for park users to listen and share. Creating a legacy space within the Community Recreation Centre,

Design Considerations

Work with Indigenous communities' to honour natural landscape as it changes due to construction, for example tree ceremonies.

Features, Programs or Amenities

Incorporate spaces for ceremony including, smudging, sacred fires, sweat lodges. Include Indigenous-only programming and gatherings that are led by Indigenous-led services and organizations.

Values and Approaches

The future park should incorporate features and programs that are trauma-informed, culturally responsive to support all members of the park community, particularly those made vulnerable by homelessness.

Consider employment opportunities that Indigenous people can participate in to create sustainable jobs.

Hire Indigenous staff and stewards in the park and community centre to ensur cultural competency in recreation programs and service delivery.

FLOOR PLAN


