What is Open for Influence

- Opportunities for park improvements, including seating & gathering areas
- Opportunities for recreation amenities, such as playground, splash pad, community garden, walking paths, tennis, basketball, etc.
- Indigenous Placekeeping (to be discussed with local Indigenous communities)
- Opportunities for key safety features, such as sight lines & lighting
- Selection of initiatives to support food security and urban agriculture
- Initiatives to support ecological & social sustainability & resilience of the park



Advisory Groups

Advisory groups include:

- Indigenous Communities Meetings
- Local Advisory Group (LAG)
- Project Champions (PCG)

It is crucial to collaborate with Indigenous communities to honour the natural landscape while it goes through changes. One way to do this is by conducting a tree ceremony

(Indigenous Communities Workshop)

Incorporate the four cardinal directions, medicines, and colours in the park.

(Indigenous Communities Workshop Group)

"I envision a park that represents the best of Toronto – a multicultural community welcoming to everyone and their beliefs able to commune with one another."

Community members shared that they would like to see a permanent and dedicated sacred fire location in the Park.

Pop-Ups

Visibility is a critical aspect of safety, this includes ensuring clear sightlines throughout the park and adequate visibility at night.

(Pop-Up participant)

It is important to have access to the showers and washroom facilities from the park without having to enter the building.

(Community Member)

"The lack of seating currently deters park users."

(Pop-Up participant)

"I would like to see improvements to the park including better swings, upgrades to the splash pad and outdoor courts; formalizing pathways crossing the field and beside the tennis courts; adding an off-leash dog area."

Cultural and natural heritage and Indigenous placekeeping will root the park in its past and celebrate its future.


The park will be **well maintained** to ensure it reflects the quality of the neighbourhoods.







Fixed components of the Park Concept





Basis of the Park Concept

Relocate the baseball diamond

Moss Park neighbourhood context is changing:

- ✓ Population growth
- ✓ Pedestrian traffic through the park
- ✓ Park size is decreasing to accommodate the Recreation Centre and the new transit station


Need to increase the use of the park by providing amenities to animate the park at all times of the year – bringing more "eyes on the park" and increasing safety for all

Existing diamond at Moss Park is **closed for use during the 7-year period of construction** of the Ontario Line subway, 2023-2030

City is relocating the leagues that play at Moss Park to other diamonds through engagement with the permit leagues

To design for this changing context, the park plan does not include a baseball diamond





Public Art

The City's Percent for Public Art Program has designated two public art projects for Moss Park park Improvements and John Innes Community Recreation Centre Replacement Project.

- An Indigenous Consultant has been hired by the City to lead the artist selection process.
- As part of the process, **six Indigenous artists** will be invited to submit proposals for the **two public art projects**.
- A five-person Indigenous jury (of community members and art professionals) will then make the final selection for one indoor artwork and one outdoor artwork.
- The entire artwork selection process will include **15 paid opportunities** for Indigenous artists, advisors, and community members.



Fixed Park Programming: Dog Off Leash Area

- Park design will include a dedicated, fenced, dog offleash area
- The off-leash area will be lit, and will animate the park year-round and throughout the day and night
- The off-leash area will function as a social space for dog owners and other park visitors that enjoy dogs
- Anticipated future development in the neighbourhood will increase the need for a formalized dog amenity in the Park

- New playground for junior and senior age play for range of abilities
- Fully accessible play value
- Accessible surfacing
- Clear sightlines for enhanced site safety
- Shaded spaces
- Potential for natural play features
- Potential for water play






