## **Project Background**

#### New parks are coming to the Six Points neighbourhood!

These new parks are a part of the City's Parkland Strategy and are located near the intersection of Bloor Street West and Kipling Avenue. The new parks will include Etobicoke Centre Park (5,500 m2), Dunkip Park (2,210 m2), and an expansion of existing Six Points Park (1,600 m2). A fourth new park referred to as Linear Park (2,708 m2) will be converted into parkland in the future.

Note: the park names for Dunkip and Etobicoke Centre are not final. The official park names will be determined through the process outlined in the City's updated Property Naming Policy.

This project is in the pre-engagement phase and community feedback collected during the community engagement process will help determine the design of the new parks and district plan.

#### **Proposed Design**

The new parks are a result of the Six Points Interchange Reconfiguration project which realigns several roads, including Kipling Avenue, Bloor Street West and Dundas Street West. The road reconfiguration has created four new park sites and several new development areas. The parks will surround the new Etobicoke Civic Centre and Civic Plaza, which is a separate project that is not within the scope of this project.

#### **Park District Vision**

The new parks coming to the Six Points neighbourhood will form a new park district that will benefit existing and future residents of the community. The new park district will provide open green spaces to a neighbourhood in need of additional park space, and may include new park amenities and features such as a playground, fitness area, seating, and recreational/leisure space as well as a dog's off-leash area (OLA). The new parks will allow for multifunctional uses by all age groups and will be designed for community members to relax and enjoy upon their visit.

#### **Project Timeline**

The anticipated schedule for this park project is as follows:

- Summer/Fall 2022 Preliminary community engagement
- Winter 2023 Hire a design team
- Spring 2023 Fall 2023 Community engagement and design development
- Spring 2024 Hire a construction team
- Summer 2024 Construction starts

### **How We Reached People**

In general, the community was informed of engagement activities through social and print media, listed below:

#### **Print Media**

#### Signage near the site

Project information was displayed on 36x48 notice boards placed near the new park sites. These notice boards provided information about the project, details about the online survey, and how to access additional information on the project webpage.

#### **Digital Media**

#### eFlyer

A digital flyer was circulated to local community groups and residents.

#### **Social Media and Digital Ads**

The City of Toronto used its Facebook, Instagram and Twitter accounts to promote the virtual community meeting and online survey through paid advertisements and organic posts from November 4<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

#### **Project Webpage**

A webpage (<u>toronto.ca/SixPointsParks</u>) was created to act as a communications portal to inform the public about the new park project. The webpage hosts all up to date information regarding the project, including links to the online survey and a sign-up button for e-updates.

### **Online Survey**

This is the second of two preliminary engagement surveys done by Parks, Forestry & Recreation (PFR) to collect the community's initial ideas for the new parks at Six Points.

The first online survey asked about preferred program options and park uses, and received a total of 1,661 responses. To learn more about the feedback received through this survey, view the summary report on the project webpage.

The second online survey focused on gathering the community's insight on preferred park amenities and feature options at three of the park locations, including Etobicoke Centre Park, Dunkip Park, and Six Points Park Expansion.

This survey was available from November 4<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup>, 2022. The survey received a **total of 791 responses**, which included input from **1,792 participants** of various ages. These responses will inform the design process for each of the three new parks.

This section presents the survey results and a summary of the most commonly received comments. A full look at the survey results can be found in Appendix A and a complete list of the text responses can be found in Appendix C.

#### **Key Feedback for Etobicoke Centre Park**

The following summarizes key feedback from the online survey, including preferred park amenities selected by participants and other frequently shared comments.

#### **Park Amenities**

Participants were asked to rank a total of 16 park amenities by importance. Roughly half of respondents (49%) ranked shade trees as most important, followed by drinking fountain/water filling station (43%), open green space (34%), shade pavilion (32%) and playground (32%).

Participants provided 259 comments in response to this question. The most frequently shared comments emphasized the need for an ice skating rink (30), a dog park or offleash area (26), and a soccer field or nets (17).

#### **Sport Areas**

Participants were asked to rank a total of three sport areas by importance. One-third of respondents (33%) ranked tennis/pickleball court as most important, followed by basketball/multi-sport court (31%), and skateboard spot (23%).

Participants provided 217 additional comments regarding Etobicoke Centre Park. The most frequently shared comments emphasized the need for a dog park or off leash area (43), a skatepark or skate spot (28), and trees (23).

#### **Key Feedback for Dunkip Park**

#### **Park Amenities**

Participants were asked to rank a total of eight park amenities by importance. Half of respondents (50%) ranked shade trees as most important, followed by shade pavilion (39%), planting areas (27%), and social gathering space (26%).

Participants provided 132 comments regarding Dunkip Park. The most frequently shared comments emphasized the need for a dog park or off leash area (30), a skatepark or skate spot (18), and green space (11).

#### **Key Feedback for Six Points Park Extension**

#### **Park Amenities**

Participants were asked to rank a total of seven park amenities by importance. Nearly half of respondents (48%) ranked shade trees as most important, followed by open green space (37%), shade pavilion (36%), and dog off-leash area (36%).

Participants provided 111 comments regarding Six Points Park Extension. The most frequently shared comments emphasized the need for a dog park or off leash area (25) and a skatepark or skate spot (20), and opposition to a dog park or off-leash area (11).

## Who did we hear from?

Participants were asked to provide demographic information. This helps the City better understand who participated and whether particular groups in the community were missed during the engagement process.

#### Key Respondent Demographic Data

- The survey received a total of **791 responses**, which included input from **1,792** participants
- More than half of respondents (54%) live/will live, work, or spend time within walking distance of the new park
- A majority of respondents (64%) identified as homeowners and 21% as renters
  - 7% of respondents identified as permanently living with parent(s) or other family member(s)
  - 6% preferred not to answer
- Less than half of respondents (43%) have access to private outdoor space like a yard
  - 38% of respondents only have access to public spaces like parks
  - 13% of respondents have access to semi-private/shared outdoor space
  - o 6% of respondents preferred not to answer
- Survey respondents were asked (optional) to provide their racial background to help the City understand who we're hearing from and identify possible perspectives that may have been missed. Data collected reveals:
  - 57% of respondents identified as white
  - 8% of respondents identified as East Asian
  - 7% of respondents identified as Latin American
  - 7% of respondents identified as South Asian or Indo-Caribbean
  - 5% of respondents identified as more than one race category or mixed race
- 3% of survey participants identified as Indigenous

- The top 5 languages survey participants prefer speaking include:
  - English (93%)
  - Ukrainian (1%)
  - $\circ$  French (1%)
  - Spanish (1%)
  - Serbian (1%)
- 12% of respondents identified as a person with a disability
  - o 76% of respondents did not identify as a person with a disability
  - 10% of respondents preferred not to answer
  - 2% of respondents don't know
- The majority of respondents (77%) found out about the survey from social media
