(<i>available in multiple languages</i>)</p> <p>Provide opportunities for frequent hand washing throughout the school day (e.g. after recess or gym class, before eating lunch or snacks).</p> <p>Provide hand washing supplies/equipment in school washrooms (i.e. liquid soap, paper towels, functioning hand dryers, etc.).</p> <p>Post TPHs Cover Your Cough and Hand Sanitizer posters (FR) in class rooms</p>	<p>Connect students and family to community supports and additional resources: Respiratory Viruses: Information for Parents & Caregivers – City of Toronto and COVID-19 – City of Toronto</p> <p>Bug Out!
