## Electronic Waste

Electronics should never be put in the garbage or Blue Bin (recycling). Electronics include, but are not limited to:

- phones & accessories (e.g. headsets)
- computers & accessories (e.g. keyboards, cables)
- TVs, monitors
- printers, scanners
- cameras
- audio/video equipment (e.g. stereos, speakers, VCRs, gaming consoles)
- musical instruments & equipment (e.g. digital pianos, amplifiers)
- smart watches

Note: just because an item has an electrical cord does not mean it is considered electronic waste.

### Disposal Options:

- Set out separately on garbage collection day (speak to your property manager if you live in a multi-residential building)
- Drop-Off Depots that accept electronic waste
- Community Environment Days (spring to fall)

## Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

HHW products are corrosive, flammable, explosive or poisonous and must not be put in the garbage, Blue Bin (recycling), Green Bin (organics) or poured down the drain, toilet or sewer.

### Why dispose of HHW properly?

- to reduce potential harm to humans, animals and the environment
- to reduce contamination of the Blue Bin (recycling)
- to reduce the amount of waste going to landfill

### Disposal Options:

- Drop-Off Depots that accept HHW
- Community Environment Days (spring to fall)
- Toxic Taxi pickup
- Certain retailers and other locations - visit [rpra.ca/find-a-collection-site/](https://rpra.ca/find-a-collection-site/)
- Pharmacies for medication and needles

# Toxic Taxi - Free pickup of HHW

## HHW items include, but are not limited to:

### Vehicle and Garage Products

- Antifreeze
- Body filler
- Brake fluid
- Car batteries
- Car wax with solvent
- Fuel (gasoline, diesel, kerosene)
- Motor oil
- Oil filters
- Windshield washer fluid



### Paints

- Alkyd/oil-based paints
- Latex/water-based paints
- Paint strippers
- Primers
- Rust removers
- Solvents
- Spray paints
- Stains, finishes
- Thinners, turpentine
- Wood preservatives



\*Empty metal paint cans (lids separated) and empty aerosol cans (lids on) go in the Blue Bin (recycling)

### Personal Care Products

- Alcohol-based lotions (aftershave, perfume, etc.)
- Medication, vitamins
- Nail polish and remover
- Needles, syringes, medical sharps



### Household Cleaning Products

- Abrasive powders
- Ammonia-based cleaners
- Bleach
- Disinfectants
- Drain cleaners
- Floor, furniture polish
- Glass, mirror cleaners
- Metal cleaners
- Oven cleaners
- Rug, upholstery cleaners
- Silver polishes



### Pesticides and Garden Products

- Fertilizers
- Fungicides
- Insecticides
- Poisons (e.g. mouse, rat, ant)
- Weed killers (herbicides)



### Other

- Air fresheners
- Batteries (all types)
- Compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs)
- Cooking oil (residential sources)
- Fire extinguisher (with pin to lock handle)
- Fluorescent tubes
- Mercury thermometers
- Propane, helium tanks
- Swimming pool chemicals



For HHW amounts between 10 and 50 litres/kilograms, a free Toxic Taxi pickup can be scheduled by contacting 311.

### Eligibility

This service is only available to the City's residential waste customers, including:

- houses/dwellings under nine units
- apartments above businesses
- multi-residential buildings (i.e. apartments, condos) with nine or more units\*

\*appointment must be scheduled by the property manager or superintendent

### Set out instructions

- Liquid materials must be in sealed, non-leaking and labelled containers (i.e. paint cans must have a lid).
- Different material types need to be kept separate (e.g. batteries, paints, light bulbs should not be mixed together in one container).
- Items should be placed in an open-topped container (e.g. cardboard box), not in a bag.
- Container with items must be placed on private property and at the front/street address side of the residence.



### Fluorescent tubes

- If requesting pickup of fluorescent tubes only, 20 to 40 are acceptable per appointment.
- Place tubes in the original box or bundle/tape together in groups of no more than eight.
- Tubes eight feet or longer must be taken to a Drop-Off Depot.



### Needles/syringes

- No minimum required.
- Must be placed in an approved sharps container (puncture proof) or in another type of plastic container (e.g. plastic jug, bottle) and sealed. Clearly label container "needles" or "syringes".
- Containers cannot be returned.
