SUMMARY REPORT: Youth Meeting

March 30, 2023



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# 1.0 Introduction

A new Community Recreation Centre (CRC) is coming to the Don Mills community, near the intersection of Eglinton Avenue East and Don Mills Road.

This large, integrated, and multi-component facility will offer the diverse and growing communities of the Don Mills Corridor and beyond a range of year-round programs and services. Located at the former Celestica Lands site at 844 Don Mills Rd., the new CRC will be next to a new large park and all within walking distance of a planned Eglinton Crosstown Light Rail Transit (ECLRT) station and is part of the ongoing implementation of the Parks and Recreation Facilities Master Plan.

# 1.1 Project Context

# **Previous Community Engagement: Recreate Don Mills**

In early 2019, community and stakeholder engagements were conducted to determine the CRC location that would best meet community needs. Two location options were presented to the community.

The results indicated that locating a large 'one-stop' community recreation centre with arena, aquatics facilities, full gymnasium and multipurpose room uses at the former Celestica Lands (844 Don Mills Road) was preferable to two separate facilities.

Based on the outcomes of the 2019 community engagement and recommendations by City staff, City Council directed the City to <u>proceed with the Preferred Facility</u> on the former Celestica Lands site.

# 1.1.1 Project Scope

The community engagement and design process for the Don Mills CRC will consider only the amenities, programs and services within the CRC located on the former Celestica Lands.

Separate community engagement processes will be held for the design and programming of the one-hectare park next to the Don Mills CRC.

The proposed CRC will include:

- An indoor twin ice pad arena / multi-use indoor sports field
- A large indoor lap and leisure pool
- A double gymnasium
- Multi-use community and activity spaces

- Fall 2021: Hire a design team
- WE ARE HERE Summer 2022 to Summer 2023: Community engagement and design development
- Winter to Fall 2023: Detailed design
- Spring 2024: Hire a construction team
- Summer 2024: Construction starts
- Winter 2027: Construction complete, Community Recreation Centre opens

# 1.2 About this Report

This meeting summary report, prepared by SAFFY, summarizes the key findings that emerged during the Youth Meeting for the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre project, held on March 22, 2023.

# 2.0 Engagement Overview

# 2.1 Engagement Objectives

The goal of the Youth Meeting was to provide an overview of the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre project, hear from youth voices on suggestions for features, amenities and programs, and provide participants with information on the Youth Ambassador opportunity and application process.

# 2.1.1 Engagement Approach

Youth Meeting Structure: During the 2-hour Youth Meeting, SAFFY and MJMA Architecture & Design guided participants through a presentation about the new Community Recreation Centre (see Appendix A for presentation slide deck). The Project Team facilitated a discussion to answer initial questions about the project, before moving into a short engagement activity to gather preliminary feedback on the youth's preferred programs and activities for the new community recreation centre.

The engagement activity asked youth to answer three questions:

- 1) How would you describe the youth of Don Mills?
- 2) What types of spaces and activities do you wish existed in the Don Mills community?
- 3) What other elements could encourage youth to access the new Don Mills CRC?

Following the engagement activity, the Project Team discussed the Youth Ambassador opportunity, application process and answered questions.

**Youth Ambassadors:** As part of the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre project, a Youth Ambassador program has been developed to ensure that youth perspectives are included in the design and programming of the space. The Youth Meeting acted as an information session for youth interested in applying.

Youth Ambassadors will support the project team by sharing information about the project with their networks and communities, and creatively capturing feedback and ideas. The 4-5 selected Youth Ambassadors will be paid an honouraria of \$500 for their participation and expected to participate in 2-3 meetings throughout the remainder of the project.

# 3.2 Summary of Feedback from the Youth Meeting

This section provides a summary of feedback and suggestions for the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre received at the Youth Meeting. See Appendix B for the Complete List of Considerations for the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre.

## **GENERAL COMMENTS**

Participants of the Youth Meeting were keen to provide their ideas and vision for the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre, and did not raise any concerns about the types of facilities that are confirmed to be included in the space. When compared to participants of the Public Meeting (December 15, 2022) or Community Advisory Committee Meeting (February 1, 2023), participants did not spend much time considering the design or aesthetics of the centre, and were more interested in the programs and types of activities that could take place.

Participants provided a range of general ideas for the space including: modular seating, a community theatre, a recording studio, plants or a greenwall, and a viewing room to watch movies or sports together. Other comments provided during the Youth Meeting are summarized by theme below.

# **FOOD-CENTRIC PROGRAMS AND AMENITIES**

Many of the youths' ideas and suggestions for the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre were centred around food, including addressing nutrition and food insecurity in the neighbourhood. Meal programs, a food bank, or a place for youth to drop-in and grab food or snacks (i.e., a community pantry) were suggested as ways to encourage youth to access the centre and to thrive in other aspects of their lives. A community garden, coffee shop, and nutrition counselling were other amenities and programs suggested by youth.

## **CAPACITY-BUILDING**

Participants expressed an interest in capacity-building programs and opportunities at the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre such as skill-building education programs, financial planning courses, and tutors or homework help. Participants mentioned that amenities like a study area, access to free Wi-Fi and computers, and a library would be beneficial to youth in the area.

# **SAFETY AND SECURITY**

Suggestions around safety and security were mentioned several times. Conversations were generally focused on preventing bike theft and having well-trained staff or security guards present to help youth feel safe accessing the Community Recreation Centre's amenities and programs. Participants also discussed the idea that safety does not look the same for everybody. Some youth shared that they avoid other City-owned facilities due to certain community members (including youth) who make the space feel unwelcoming and unsafe.

## SENSE OF OWNERSHIP AND PRIDE

Participants shared that they would like to see people take pride in the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre to ensure that it feels like a community space and to encourage people to take care of the amenities provided at the centre. Suggestions for improving a sense of ownership of the space included community arts-based activities such as a mural, decorating the Community Recreation Centre's shared spaces, as well as community clean-up initiatives, and opportunities to promote and create additional programming opportunities within the broader community.

# **INCLUSION**

Youth expressed that the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre should provide facilities and amenities that make the space welcoming and accessible for the diverse local community, which includes a large Muslim community. They discussed the ways that a multi-faith prayer room could support people from many religious backgrounds and allow them to spend more time in the space. Participants would like to see staff that reflect the diversity of the community, subsidized or accessible programs, and a welcoming, safe and non-judgmental environment.

## SPORTS AND FITNESS

The sports and fitness-related facilities were not discussed much when compared to other elements; however, youth would like to see the Don Mills Community Recreation Centre provide women's-only fitness opportunities, a fitness instructor (e.g., to teach people how to use equipment), adequate equipment for various sports, and more ice time available to members of the immediate community (rather than being booked up by members of other communities with better access to rink facilities).

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# Land Acknowledgement





 Collect back of house and vehicular functions towards the north along Mike Palmateer Rd, adjacent to CPR tracks







- The feedback collected during this engagement process helped refine and inform the design of both indoor and outdoor spaces of the new Community Centre.










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# Case Study #2

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

Youth Ambassadors will be provided with project information and expected to connect with their local networks and community to collect ideas and feedback to inform the design, development and programming of the new Don Mills CRC

The feedback and ideas collected should be captured and communicated in a **creative method** which can be shared with the project team, public and local community. This creative method could include (but is not limited to): **an audio diary, podcast or sound piece, a video or animation work, a collage, a collection of writing** (poems, short stories, interviews, etc.).

**Compensation:** Youth Ambassadors **will be paid an honoraria of \$500** for their participation. This honoraria will be paid upon completion of the work.


