City of Toronto Shelter System

- Currently the largest in Canada, providing shelter and support to more than 11,000 people
- Demand for shelter space has increased due to:

 Housing cost and insufficient affordable supply
 - $\,\circ\,\text{A}$ volatile economy with high inflation
 - $\ensuremath{\circ}$ Low wages and income supports
 - $_{\odot}$ Growing demand from refugee claimants
- Demand is expected to continue to rise during the winter months





Programs are located within communities

Toronto Shelter Locations and other Social Services - November 2023



Providing shelter to people experiencing homelessness is an important community service offered in neighbourhoods across Toronto.

Other City Services

- Daily outreach to those living outside, including in encampments
- Housing support through non-profit agencies, shelter and outreach staff
- Pet services, including food and emergency veterinary care
- Network of public washrooms, showers and drinking fountains
- Drop-ins services people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness

Shelter Location Criteria

- Shelters are one of many municipal services that the City provides. Like daycares, libraries and community centres, shelters must be available in neighbourhoods across Toronto.
- When searching for a shelter location, City staff will seek buildings that are available, affordable, of a suitable size, and close to transit and services.
- If the site meets shelter by-laws and other zoning requirements, City staff have the authority to enter into new or amend existing agreements for homelessness services that meet zoning requirements before engaging with the community.
- The engagement process is focused on ensuring the site is successful in the community

629 Adelaide Street West

- St. Felix Centre and the City will open an approximately 50space shelter at 629 Adelaide St. W. in early spring 2024 with a 10-year lease
- This site is a relocation of the respite program operated by St. Felix Centre at 25 Augusta Ave which closed to be converted into new affordable housing of 31 units
- Originally envisioned as a 24-hour respite site, it will open as a shelter for single adults of all genders



Shelter Details at 629 Adelaide Street West

• As a shelter, the site will:

Have mandatory intake triage processes
Provide comprehensive case management and housing support for all shelter guests
Offer wrap-around supports and space for recreation and programming, mental health and crisis management, and

- income/employment supports
- Clients at the shelter are expected to participate in goal setting, case management and work on a housing plan





Programming at 629 Adelaide Street West

St. Felix Centre

St. Felix Centre has been providing supportive programming to marginalized individuals in downtown Toronto

The shelter will be run by St. Felix Centre and offers:

- Safe shelter and temporary accommodation to people experiencing homelessness
- Case management (assessment, program supports and referrals to community services/resources) assigned to all shelter guests
- ✓ Housing supports
- ✓ Meals
- ✓ Primary health care, mental health and harm reduction supports
- ✓ Recreational programming
- ✓ Pet services





Program Goals

- Provide safe space and stabilizing supports for people currently living outside
- Support shelter guests with finding and maintaining permanent housing
- Develop programming that has a focus on building life skills and mental and physical wellness.
- Build a strong sense of community internally and externally
- Create programming opportunities that engage both the surrounding community and shelter residents together



Rights and Responsibilities

- Shelter guests are equal citizens of the city and have the same rights, freedoms and responsibilities as other residents of the city.
- They have the right to a safe place to shelter and a welcoming program.
- There are conduct expectations and rules for all guests that must be followed when staying in shelter programs.
- On-site supervisors meet with guests 1-on-1 at intake into the program, to review the Good Neighbour's Policy and remind them of rules and guidelines.



Community Safety and Outreach

- 2 Community Safety Teams (CST) doing outreach in the area on a 24/7 basis, 2 CST members per team
 - Pick up hazards such as needles
 - Help to address inappropriate activity and build rapport
 - Monitor the catchment area including laneways, green spaces and sidewalks
- All staff members trained to respond to immediate non-police or non-EMS related matters
- Additional external security cameras will be installed
- Additional outdoor fencing for guests privacy will be installed
