2024 Interim Property Tax Bill Information



Interim property tax bill

The interim property tax bill is the first of two tax bills you will receive in 2024. Your final property tax bill will be mailed in May 2024. If you receive a Property Assessment Change Notice from the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC), you will also receive a Supplementary/Omitted Tax Bill from the City.

Tax and utility relief programs

The City offers various relief programs for property taxes and utilities. Applicants must apply annually by the deadline and meet the eligibility criteria to participate in these programs. - Property Tax, Water and Solid Waste Relief Programs for low-income seniors and low-income persons living with disabilities who own a residential property. Learn more at toronto.ca/taxandutilityrelief.
- Cancellation, Reduction or Refund of Taxes Tax
 appeals are available to owners of properties that
 undergo changes during the year (i.e. change in property
 class, building was demolished or undergoing repairs or
 renovations). Homeowners who are unable to pay taxes
 because of sickness or extreme poverty may also be
 eligible for a property tax reduction.
- Charity Rebates for registered charities occupying property space in a commercial or industrial building.

For the 2023 taxation year, the deadline to apply for Tax Appeals and Charity Rebates is February 29, 2024.

Home Energy Loan Program (HELP)

Vacant Home Tax

Owners of residential properties in Toronto must declare the occupancy status of their property every year, even if they live there. The deadline to declare occupancy status for the 2023 calendar year is February 29, 2024. Residential properties that are unoccupied for more than six months, or properties for which no declaration is submitted, will be subject to the tax (one per cent of a property's Current Value Assessment). Declarations submitted after the deadline will be charged a late fee. Find more details and declare your property's occupancy status at toronto.ca/VacantHomeTax.

Important information

Send your payment on time

Payments must reach our office on or before the due date to avoid penalty/interest charges. If mailing payment through Canada Post, send payment well in advance of the due date to ensure it reaches our office on time.

Failed Payments

For accounts that have a failed payment (payments that do not clear through your financial institution or declined credit card payments), an administrative fee and penalty/interest may apply.

Tax account adjustments

If you file a Request for Reconsideration (RfR), an assessment appeal, or apply for any of the City's property tax relief programs, you must continue to pay your property taxes in the amount billed by the due date. Once all changes or approvals are processed, your property tax account will be adjusted.

Credit balances

Credit balances of \$3,000 or less on your tax account will be applied to reduce your interim tax instalment amounts.
