



Stage 2 of City of Toronto Single-Use and Takeaway Items Reduction Strategy

Single-Use and Takeaway Items Bylaw

- On December 15, 2023 City Council adopted the <u>Update and Action Plan on the</u> Single-Use and Takeaway Items Reduction Strategy, including the Circular Food Innovators Fund with amendments including the adoption of a new Single-Use and Takeaway Items Bylaw (Bylaw)
- The new Bylaw takes effect March 1, 2024

Applicability

- The new Bylaw applies to all retail business establishments
- A retail business establishment is defined as: a premise, location, or operation where goods and/or services are offered for sale
 - stores, on-line businesses, eating or drinking establishments, convenience stores, grocery stores, delicatessens, caters, mobile food vendors, street vendors, vending machines, bookstores and clothing stores



Applicability (continued)

- As the following are not considered retail business establishments, the Bylaw does **not** apply to:
 - shelters, hospitals and medical facilities, places of worship, school nutrition programs and other similar facilities that may provide single-use accessory food items as a part of their operations
- However, the Bylaw does apply to retail business establishments located within these organizations (e.g. a gift shop inside a hospital)

Exemptions

- Retail business establishments selling goods and services at a City property event
 (i.e., a single day or multi-day public or private event that has been permitted by the
 City to occur on city property)
 - City property event: retail business establishments selling goods and services at a permitted event (e.g. The Festival of Lights) taking place in Nathan Phillips Square
- Restricted events (i.e., a single day or multi-day public or private event restricted through requirement of a ticket or otherwise not open to general public attendance)
 - Restricted event: retail business establishments selling goods and services at an event venue (e.g. a stadium or arena hosting a sports game or concert, or a zoo or museum) requiring a ticket to enter



To comply with the Bylaw, retail business establishments are required to operationalize the following measures:

1. Ask-First/By-Request

- for single-use accessory food items & single-use paper shopping bags
- o prior to distributing a single-use accessory food item, either
 - (i) ask a customer if they need the item,
 - (ii) have a customer request the item, or
 - (iii) make the item available to a customer in a self-serve station
- o prior to distributing a single-use paper shopping bag, either
 - (i) ask a customer if they need the bag, or
 - (ii) have a customer request the bag



To comply with the Bylaw, retail business establishments are required to operationalize the following measures:

2. Accepting the use of Reusable Items

- o accept the use of reusable shopping bags and
- accept the use of reusable beverage cups by customers

3. Compatibility

 only distribute single-use paper shopping bags to their customers that are compatible with the City's waste diversion programs

Ask-First/By-Request requirement for single-use accessory food items

- What are single-use accessory food Items?
 - o ordinarily used only once before being disposed of as waste
 - o can be made of any type of material, not just plastic
 - examples include utensils, straws, stir sticks, spill plugs, napkins, condiment cups and packets, cup sleeves and takeout trays
- Requirement for retail business establishments prior to providing a customer with single-use food accessory items
 - o may use self-serve accessory food item stations
 - must ensure that online ordering platforms offer customers the option to request single-use accessory food items

Ask-First/By-Request requirement for single-use paper shopping bags

- What is a single-use paper shopping bag?
 - a shopping bag made of paper
 - o equal to or greater than 15cm x 20cm when flat
 - designed to be used once and disposed of as waste
- Requirement for retail business establishments prior to providing a customer with a single-use paper shopping bag
- Exemption
 - Does not apply to paper bags designed and used to hold only loose bulk items, bakery goods not pre-packaged, loose small hardware items, flowers or potted plants, prescription drugs, free samples



Accepting the use of reusable shopping bags

- What is a reusable shopping bag?
 - o a shopping bag that is:
 - o designed to be used more than once
 - made of fabric and/or other durable materials suitable for reuse and
 - capable of being washed or disinfected
- Required to accept a customer's use of a reusable shopping bag to carry their purchase



Accepting the use of reusable beverage cups

- What is a reusable beverage cup?
 - a hot or cold beverage cup designed to be used more than once, made from durable material and capable of being washed or disinfected
- Required to permit the use of a reusable beverage cup by a customer to hold either a hot or cold beverage obtained at the retail business establishment
- A retail business establishment shall not permit or facilitate the use of a customer's reusable beverage cup if it is not:
 - of sound construction, in good repair, of a shape and of material that permits it to be readily cleaned and sanitized, visibly clean or, otherwise suitable to be used as a beverage cup



Compatibility of single-use paper shopping bags

 Single-use paper shopping bags must be compatible with the City's diversion programs (i.e., no metal grommets or plastic handles)

The City of Toronto remains committed to resources and energy to produce, collect and dispose of. These items often end up in landfill or as litter, which can pose risks to the environment and animals.



Quick Facts

- · Reusable products are the lowest waste option.
- · Paper products coated with plastic or wax cannot be composted in the City's Green Bin organics program or recycled in the City's Blue Bin recycling program. These products unless otherwise advised by your waste collection service provider.
- Most paper fibre products are compatible with the City's Green Bin visit toronto.ca/reducingsingleuseprogram. organics program if soiled with food or drink residue.
- · Compostable and biodegradable plastic items, such as cups, containers and utensils, are not accepted in the City's Green Bin organics program or Blue Bin recycling program. These products should be disposed of in the garbage unless otherwise advised by your waste collection service provider.



SUTI Stage 3

- City staff have been directed by Council to report back in Q1 of 2025 on further measures to reduce single-use and takeaway items, including the feasibility of expanding the Single-Use and Takeaway Items Bylaw further to include:
 - 1. Large event venues
 - 2. Acceptance of reusable food containers provided by a customer at retail business establishments and
 - 3. Requirements for retail business establishment operators to use reusable food containers and beverage cups in their dine-in operations in Toronto
