



#### Feasibility Study: Potential Washroom Pavillion

We explored options for locating a 4 seasons washroom on site, and concluded that the washroom is best located along Wellington, which has good visibility from the street, and can be used by people in South Stanley park as well.

#### Feasibility Study: Potential Future Community Garden

We explored locations for a potential future relocated Garrison Flats Community Garden. If the garden is required to be moved, there is room for it in this location.

PFR can provide servicing to this site and grade it to be suitable for a garden in the future. All further discussion about moving the garden will be between the Housing Secretariat and the Garrison Flats Community Garden group.

# Refined Vision & Design Principles



#### What We've Heard

#### **Phase 3a: Online Survey**

We heard from 802 respondents on their thoughts and concerns to inform the park's vision statement and design.

78% of respondents liked the vision statement. The following are comments and concerns sorted by theme:

- Ecological Design promote ecological restoration, biodiversity, safe space for urban wildlife, and green spaces.
- Amenities prioritize diversity, inclusivity, accessibility, functionality, relaxation, and sociability within the park.
- Connections emphasize the importance of wayfinding using accessible signage and connectivity with other parks.
- Dynamic & Playful attach meaningfulness and realism to this vision by prioritizing functionality and relaxation.
- **Dogs** ensure safety, maintenance, order, and cleanliness by enforcing animal by-laws.
- Wording use more contextual, realistic, and specific language to achieve relatability.

Additional thoughts include participant suggestions such as incorporating a multicultural and unique park identity, preserving views, emphasizing natural landscaping, and promoting a healthy urban ecology close connections with nature.

#### What We've Heard

#### Phase 3a: Community Pop-Ups

We heard from **255** community members to gather feedback on the draft vision and design concepts ("big moves").

Participants expressed a desire for:

- A clean and simple design.
- An abundance of green and natural elements e.g., colorful vegetation, meadows, and wildlife habitat.
- Inclusivity to a diverse range of visitors and residents to the area including children.
- The protection of views.
- Accessible and diverse seating options and paths with shade protection from weather conditions e.g., picnic table and amphitheater-style seating.
- A flexible design that supports sociability and community gathering creatively e.g., community garden and public art displays.

#### What We've Heard

#### Phase 3a: CAC Meeting 3

CAC members (individuals and organizational members of the community) provided feedback about the community's priorities.

#### Many resonated with the draft vision statement and the draft design principles.

Feedback regarding the draft vision statement and design principles included:

- Simplify and shorten the overall design, as well as the vision statement and principles.
- Utilize visualizations such as images and diagrams to resonate with the community.
- Ensure a more balanced mix of hard and soft scaping elements particularly to include greenery and less pathways.
- Include a cohesive mix between both ac tive spaces as well as pockets of secluded quiet areas.
- Increase the diversity of vegetation and tree species.
- Incorporate a children's play area and a water feature.
- Cater more toward the local community as opposed to visitors and tourists.
- Emphasize multiple forms of street furniture such as lighting, signage, flexible seating, and drinking fountains.

#### Vision Statement

Ordnance and Wellington parks will provide a unique urban oasis with spectacular views of the City skyline, and new enhanced connections to the adjacent community and broader open space network.

Together the parks will provide a balance between green, ecological design; restful open spaces; and the creation of a dynamic, playful public realm.



## Preferred Design Concept



The preferred concept for the new parks at Ordnance and Wellington includes sculpted landform features to create distinct outdoor spaces, creating balance between active and passive experiences and emphasizing the unique expansive views toward the City skyline.

The open lawns, naturalized meadows, and shrub/perennial plantings provide a range of landscape types and habitats for urban wildlife. Native canopy trees are planted in arrangements that frame views, and provide shade and seasonal colour and texture.



#### **Wellington Park**


Though careful manipulation of topography, the preferred concept for Wellington Park, improves overall circulation within the park and to adjacent public spaces, providing new flexible programmable space while preserving existing uses.


The park features an upper plateau with an open lawn, framed by a curving berm.
The topography of the plateau and berm also define the lower park, which features a linear rain garden and native pollinator meadows, spaces for more intimate and reflective experiences.



Cross-section A-A' through Wellington Park


# **Preferred Concept** Wellington Park - Circulation Hierarchy





#### **Ordnance Park**

The preferred concept for Ordnance Park, builds on the existing topography of the site, creating a peninsula that rises over the rail corridor to provide unique views to the City skyline.


The upper plateau features a flexible open lawn and a children's play area, framed by gentle berms and largescale swings looking out over an upland meadow. The upper plateau slopes down to the lower plateau to provide an intimate experience at the eastern tip of the peninsula, allowing visitors to overlook the railways and planted slopes of the park.









# **Preferred Concept Ordnance Park - Lower Plateau**




#### Ordnance Park - Looking West toward Strachan Avenue




#### Ordnance Park - Looking East toward Downtown Toronto


## Questions and Discussion
