


Land Acknowledgement

The land I am standing on today is the traditional territory of many nations including the Mississaugas of the Credit, the Anishnabeg, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee and the Wendat peoples and is now home to many diverse First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. I also acknowledge that Toronto is covered by Treaty 13 signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit, and the Williams Treaties signed with multiple Mississaugas and Chippewa bands.



CONNECT


Extend the park experience by connecting parks to each other and between other open spaces, to create a seamless public realm.








Key Insights


- Parks are accessed by public transit or cycling

- Feel safe e.g. brighter lights
- Have ample shade e.g. shade near splash pads
- Have regular upkeep e.g. washrooms
- Have more space for sports e.g. outdoor fitness areas
- Have better access e.g. connections between parks/ravines
- Have well maintained trails e.g. add mirrors on tight turns

Draft Vision

"The parks network serving the Kennedy Park-Ionview community will be safe, accessible and welcoming to diverse people of all ages and abilities. The parks network will offer clean, beautiful, and well-maintained outdoor spaces that bring people together year-round, fostering social connection and a sense of belonging for everyone. Park visitors will be able to relax and experience nature through sustainable park design and improved access to ravines. A variety of amenities, recreational facilities and programs will reflect the needs and interests of the local community, ensuring that parks are inviting and multi-use spaces. It will be easy, comfortable and convenient to travel to, from and within the park network and to other community destinations."

The City of Toronto will dedicate time, space, and money to create and maintain meaningful relationships with First Nations, Inuit, and Métis communities, leaders, collectives, and organizations. These relationships will be rooted in early engagement, collaboration, co-development, equal partnership, and power shifting. Within the context of these relationships, the City will collaborate to restore truth, right relations, and contribute to a just future for Indigenous Peoples.

Creating the Local Parks Plan



The Local Parks Plan will include:

Vision

summarizing the community's aspirations for the Kennedy Park-Ionview parks and open space system.

Long-term Recommendations

to guide decisions-making and resource allocation for parks initiatives. These may require council approval, a large budget and/or partnerships and include initiatives such as: parkland acquisitions, parkland dedications, or new park facilities/amenities.

Immediate Opportunities

that can be implemented relatively quickly and are lower cost projects such as improvements to signage and lighting, increased tree plantings and other landscape elements, public art opportunities, and better connections to and within the parks and open space network.


