


## **Centennial Park Master Plan**

#### **Indigenous Engagement**

- Consultation with Rights Holders
- Indigenous Advisory Circle (IAC) for the Master Plan Implementation

  - First IAC meeting was on June 13, 2024.


#### **Stakeholder Advisory Group (SAG) for the Master Plan Implementation**

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# Skate Trail, Chalet, and Parking Lot Improvements Timeline

#### **Skate Trail Improvements:**

- New artificial ice skating trail including change room facility in the chalet
- Design: 2023/2024
- Construction: 2024/2025

#### **Hill Trail Improvements:**

- Accessible Pathways/Trails including the lookout nodes
- Design: 2023/24 Construction: 2024/25





Conceptual Rendering: Centennial Hill / Enhanced Community Programming Hub (2023-24) Summer




## **Parking Lot Improvements Plan**

- State of good repair work to parking lots 1-5 including storm water management system.
- Design: 2024 -Construction: 2024/25
- Current Construction:
  - Phase 1 north parking lot on Centennial Park Road.
  - Will be completed by end of Summer 2024 - phased to accommodate the large events in the park



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#### **Skate Trail Site Plan**





#### What We Heard - Online Survey, January 2024

Features respondents want to see in the public plaza: handrails for assistance onto the ice (43%); group seating (42%); shade structure (36%). 87% like or feel neutral about the proposed design of the skating trail and the plaza: 72% of respondents like it and 15% neither like nor dislike it.

20% responded with "other": more trees and plantings (13%)'


Planting areas and seating options were the two areas respondents said needed improvement.

29% of respondents shared additional overall feedback about trail length or width (13%); seating along skate trail (9%).

#### WHAT WAS ADDED TO THE DESIGN:

- Additional flexible seating
- A new shade structure
- Handrail
- Additional plantings

# **Playground and Water Play Improvements**


A new Destination Playground and Water Play Area, in a unified space celebrating the nearby natural environment.

This will include:

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- New playground and water play
- Social gathering spaces and picnicking opportunities
- Indigenous Placekeeping
- Accessibility improvements and inclusive play
- Renovated washroom building
- Parking lot and pathway improvements

#### What We Heard - Online Survey, January 2024

#### The final phase of public engagement.

#### Public Online Survey January 5 to 29th, 2024


- 296 respondents
- The survey invited input on the final design options for the playground including preferred features and equipment for the playground and water play area.
- The majority of survey respondents are satisfied or very satisfied with the preferred designs for the washroom pavilion, entry plaza, picnic, water play, hillside, and playground areas.

#### **Indigenous Advisory Circle** January 24th, 2024

- The four placekeeping elements were well received.
- There was request for more diverse storytelling and greater representation of Representation of the Mississauga of the Credit First Nation and Haudenosaunee Confederacy. These comments will be addressed and expanded on through the Centennial Park Indigenous Advisory Circle.

## **Sport Hubs and Recreational Facilities**

#### Three Phases of Sport Improvements

#### Phase 1 New Baseball Hub

- Repurpose go-cart track back to public park use
- 4 new baseball / softball diamonds (1)
  - Includes 4 independent batting cages
- 8 beach volleyball courts (2)
- 12 pickleball courts (3)
- New social gathering spaces including a shelter (6,7)
- Includes new lighting and irrigation
- Improvements to parking lots (4)
- New multi-use trails (9)

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- (10-14) to be delivered as part of Phase 3
- Design 2023/24 Construction 2024



#### What We Heard: Online Survey, January 2024

82% like or feel neutral about the proposed Baseball Hub design: 56% of respondents said they like it and 26% neither like nor dislike it.

#### **Pickleball:**

**Open or fenced walkways between pickleball court: no preference** 

Beach volleyball:

Net posts: two separate net posts for each court

#### **Baseball/softball:**

Red clay infield material & flooring type for dugouts: no preference.

Roofing for the dugouts: solid roof.

Proposed batting cage locations: 40% liked the locations; 42% neither liked nor disliked them.



Outdoor seating type: a majority of respondents prefer a mix of both benches and tables with chairs.

30% of respondents shared additional overall feedback about batting cages (42%); go karts (6%); washrooms (6%); seating for spectators (5%); more shade (5%).

Sun protection: 46% prefer seating with a shade structure; 43% prefer a mix of both shaded and sunexposed seating

#### HOW THE DESIGN CHANGED:

- Layout and configuration of pickleball courts
- Gathering spaces near the courts
- Additional shade structures

## **Sport Hubs and Recreational Facilities**

#### Phase 2 New Soccer Hub

- Removal of eastern baseball diamonds
- New turf, irrigation, and lighting
- New accessible pathways & viewing areas
- Open plateau design with moveable equipment allowing flexible multi-purpose field use
- Design 2023/24– Construction 2024/25

#### **Phase 3 Field Houses**

#### (one by the baseball hub, one by the soccer hub)

- Premier natural turf with irrigation and lighting
- Four season fieldhouse
- Design 2024 Construction 2025/26

#### **Stadium Bubble**

An air supported structure will be investigated to allow year-round use of the existing artificial turf sport field within the stadium or may be placed as part of one of the adjacent fields.

This will include new supporting infrastructure (e.g. grade beam footing and pressurizing mechanical facility).


Feasibility Review: 2024 Design\*: 2024/2025 Construction\*: 2027/28

#### **Elmcrest Creek Rehabilitation**

The benefits of stream restoration include:

- Improved water quality
- Stabilized stream banks
- Enhanced natural corridors that aid fish and wildlife movement
- Increased riparian and in-stream habitat
- Improved passive and active recreation opportunities

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Channelized stream before restoration.

# Indigenous Placekeeping

Indigenous Advisory Circle (IAC) as been formed to provide valuable feedback on important project phases throughout 2024 – 2025

Collaborate with Indigenous architects, consultants, and community members to inform design elements & Indigenous Placekeeping opportunities

Identify priority projects highlighting Indigenous design, language, and knowledge

Indigenous Placekeeping will be incorporated into playground design





## Indigenous Advisory Circle

- An Indigenous Advisory Circle (IAC) has been created to identify and explore Indigenous Placekeeping opportunities throughout the park. These initiatives will highlight Indigenous design, language, and knowledge
- Indigenous Placekeeping will be incorporated into playground design informed by Indigenous consultants and community members
- The first IAC Meeting was held on Monday, June 17th and we explored:
  - Ceremonial Spaces
  - Ceremonial Fires
  - Sweat Lodge
  - Indigenous Artworks
  - Interpretive & Educational Signage



### Improved Trail Network Parkwide



## Improved Trail Network

Grade and surface improvements will be made to the interior arterial pathways. These improvements include:

- New multi-use trail along Centennial Park Blvd. from Eglinton Ave to Rathburn Rd.
- New multi-use trail along Rathburn Rd. from Centennial Park Blvd to the Olympium
- New park gateway entrances and wayfinding
- Hard surfacing granular arterial pathways

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Design: 2023 – Construction\*: 2023-2025

\*Construction to be coordinated with other projects' phasing.
