## > Land Acknowledgement



## Community Dialogue What has happened so far at 66 Third St?

#### The City has been working closely with the Councillor to collect feedback:

66 Third St Project Launched Dec 2024

**Door-to-door canvass of immediate** residential area and businesses

Hosted two (2) Woods Manor coffee and conversation events

Hosted three (3) parent focus groups and parent info night

Hosted two (2) faith leader focus groups

**Met with New Toronto Lakeshore Village Residents Association** 

**Met with Lakeshore Village BIA** 

Dropped 2000+ invitation flyers (knocked on 1,500+ doors)

Hosted in-person drop-in session attend by more than 300 residents

Received and responded to more than 350 emails and calls

More than 450+ people have signed up to receive more info



## Community Feedback What we've heard – Key Themes



1 Shelter Location

**Concern about New Toronto and Third St, site selection process, loss of parking** 

Communications & Engagement

Process concerns, need for transparent updates, and opportunities for input

Community Safety

**Concerns about increased risks** 

Design & Construction

Feasibility, clarity on size, aesthetics, outdoor space, crime prevention

Need for Shelters

Need for shelters in the community, requests to expedite the process

Shelter Operations

Clarity on the shelter operator, demographic, programming, and safety and security



## Background Recap Why are shelters opening?

- Toronto's shelter system is full. There is an urgent need to address the issue of homelessness
- Toronto City Council approved the Homelessness Services Capital Infrastructure Strategy (HSCIS)
- Housing is the ultimate solution to homelessness, and shelters are necessary to fill gaps with critical services
- In December 2024, 66 Third St. was announced as one of the first six HSCIS sites to be developed into a shelter

## Shelter Updates — 66 Third St. Keeping you informed at each stage of shelter development

## The City is moving forward with the shelter development of 66 Third St. and other locations across Toronto

- Will shelter seniors experiencing homelessness with approx. 50 spaces
  - Data driven and need for Seniors' shelter spaces
  - Directly next to Woods Manor Seniors' building
  - Consideration of community feedback
- Christie Ossington Neighbourhood Centre (CONC) will be the shelter operator
  - Undergone a competitive EOI process



## Shelter Siting Process Why 66 Third St? Who decides and how?

- TSSS, CREM, and CreateTO undertook a real estate review to identify potential sites for new shelters
- Toronto Parking Authority (TPA) deemed 66 Third St. as surplus, for City-building opportunities aligned with Council priorities
- 66 Third St. was chosen for shelter use by City staff based on meeting the key shelter site criteria
- Shelters are successfully located in residential areas, often close to libraries, schools, daycares, and community centres



#### **Key Shelter Site Criteria**

- 1. Site Availability, Fair Market Value
- 2. Permitted for Shelter Use
- 3. Site Size
- 4. Proximity from Existing Shelters
- 5. Access to Amenities
- **6. Proximity to Public Transit**



## Shelter Operations How does a shelter run? What supports are available?

## All shelters have trained staff on-site 24/7, with shelter programming that will be tailored to the needs of senior clientele.

Referrals for income assistance as required (applications to Old Age Security and Canadian Pension Plan)

Case management through a housing first lens, including applications to seniors housing opportunities

Access to primary health care and mental health care, including Personal Support Workers and referrals to Long-Term Care

Key questions we have received:	Shelter service model for 66 Third St.	Historical service model
Are clients required to leave every morning?	No, clients are not required to leave or "kicked out" from the shelter	Previously, yes this did take place at select sites.
How long do clients typically stay at a shelter?	Clients stay in a shelter approximately six months	At many sites, clients often move from shelter to shelter
Are in-house services provided?	Yes, in-house services and programs are included and available on-site	Little or no supports were provided on-site
Is food provided at the shelter?	Three (3) meals are provided daily	One (1) meal per day, or no meals provided





Christie Ossington Neighbourhood Centre (CONC), founded in 1993, provides essential services for vulnerable community members.

CONC is dedicated to building upon the strengths and vision of community members to improve the quality of life in the Christie Ossington community and surrounding neighbourhoods.

By working in collaboration with residents, community institutions, agencies, local businesses and stakeholders, we will create a safe and healthy community.








