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## **Consultation Summary**

Public and interest group consultation for Thistletown Streets Plan took place from April to June 2025, with public comment period open for four weeks from May 14 to June 10, 2025.

Consultation activities included one-on-one conversations with schools, community serving organizations, other community interest groups and over 50 businesses. Pop-up events and a public drop-in event were hosted along with an online survey and continued comment tracking. The project team interacted with approximately 100 people at in-person events and over 185 survey responses were received, five people provided comments via phone and email.

Communications to notify the public and interest groups about the project included a project webpage, targeted emails to over 30 community interest groups, 9,300 flyers (in English and Punjabi) distributed by Canada Post throughout the project area along with staff participation in community group meetings and door-to-door outreach to schools, community serving organizations and businesses. On-street signage with project information was installed in the neighbourhood and project notices and postcards were made available at three local community centres.

Top priorities and issues raised by participants through the Phase 1 consultation were:

- Excessive speeding at several locations in the project area. Participants frequently
  mentioned speeding concerns on Thistle Down Boulevard, Bankfield Road, Barker
  Avenue, Riverdale Drive and Kipling Avenue; and requested installation of speed
  bumps, speed humps, four-way stop signs and better signages.
- Excessive non-local traffic resulting in speeding, congestion and safety issues on residential streets. Participants said there is a need for turn restrictions, signage to divert traffic, and one-way conversions to manage non-local traffic on Calstock Drive, Riverdale Drive, Barker Drive, and other residential streets.
- Congestion and safety concerns during school pick-up and drop-off times near schools. Participants highlighted the need to develop and enforce 'kiss and ride' zones near schools.
  - At Beaumonde Heights Junior Public School, participants requested increased parking enforcement and an additional crossing guard at the intersection of Monterrey Drive and Amaron Drive.
  - At St. John Vianney Catholic School, non-compliance of turning and parking restrictions was highlighted.
- Need for improved infrastructure for pedestrians and people cycling on several streets in the project area, including crosswalks, sidewalks, bike lanes and bike stands.
- Need for safety improvements on several streets and intersections to ensure safety
  for all road users, including pedestrians, people cycling and motor vehicles. Participants
  highlighted need for improved visibility, speed reduction measures, removing parking
  where it leads to congestions, and ensuring parking and stop-sign compliance.

A second phase of consultation is planned for Winter 2026 to receive feedback on the proposed changes to address issues identified during Phase 1.

## **Project Overview**

Neighbourhood Streets Plans (NSPs) are a service for neighbourhoods where traffic and travel patterns may be impacting the safety and mobility of people using the streets. The Thistletown neighbourhood was nominated for a Neighbourhood Streets Plan (NSP) by the Ward 1 Councillor in the 2024 NSP program cycle.


The Thistletown Streets Plan (NSP) aims to identify, prioritize and recommend short and long-term improvements to traffic operations and road design to support safety for all modes of transportation. The Plan aims to address four main areas of concern:

- 1. Road safety for vulnerable road users (e.g. pedestrians, children, older adults and people cycling)
- 2. Excessive speeding
- 3. Excessive motor vehicle traffic on local streets
- 4. Opportunities for active transportation

The project area is located between Kipling Avenue to the west, and bounded by Humber River to the north, south and east.

#### **Communication Activities**

A variety of methods were used to notify people of the project and opportunities to participate:

- Project webpage toronto.ca/ThistletownStreets
- Notice delivered via Canada Post (9,300 addresses in the project area). Notice translated in Punjabi.
- Email to interest groups including residents' associations, community groups, organizations, institutions and elected officials (30+ contacts)
- In-person visits and post-card drops at 15+ organizations and schools and 50+ businesses.
- On-street signage posted in the neighbourhood.

#### What We Heard

Top priorities and issues raised by participants through the Phase 1 consultation were:

- Excessive speeding at several locations in the project area. Participants frequently
  mentioned speeding concerns on Thistle Down Boulevard, Bankfield Road, Barker
  Avenue, Riverdale Drive and Kipling Avenue; and requested installation of speed
  bumps, speed humps, four-way stop signs and better signages.
- Excessive non-local traffic resulting in speeding, congestion and safety issues on residential streets. Participants said there is a need for turn restrictions, signages to divert traffic and one-way conversions to manage non-local traffic on Calstock Drive, Riverdale Drive, Barker Drive, and other residential streets.
- Congestion and safety during school pick-up and drop-off times near schools.
   Participants highlighted the need to develop and enforce 'kiss and ride' zones near schools.
  - At Beaumonde Heights Junior Public School, participants requested for increased parking enforcement and an additional crossing guard at the intersection of Monterrey Drive and Amaron Drive.
  - At St. John Vianney Catholic School, non-compliance of turning and parking restrictions was highlighted as a cause for concern. Participants suggested installing better signage.

- Need for improved infrastructure for pedestrians and people cycling on several streets in the project area, including crosswalks, sidewalks, bike lanes and bike stands.
- Need for safety improvements on several streets and intersections to ensure safety for all road users, including pedestrians, people cycling and motor vehicles. Participants highlighted need for improved visibility, speed reduction measures, removing parking where it leads to congestions, and ensuring parking and stop-sign compliance.

## **Interactive Map and Survey**

An online interactive map, hosted on Social Pinpoint, invited respondents to identify location-specific concerns or opportunities for transportation changes. Participation was anonymous, and optional demographic questions were included in an associated survey (see Appendix for Survey Participant Profile).


#### Postal Code | n (total number of responses) =186

A total of 186 responses were received for the following optional demographic question below. All responses came from respondents who provided postal codes from the project area, with 99% from M9V postal code.




#### **Relationship to the Project Area |** n= 160

160 responses were received for this question. 94% were from respondents who lived in the project area, 3% who worked in the project area and 2% from those who represent/own a business in the project area.




#### Typical Ways of Travelling In/Near the Project Area | n=169

Of the 169 responses received for this question, almost half, 49%, were from respondents who drive in the project area, followed by 41% who walk in the project area. 4% came from those who bike and 1% who use public transit.




**Age |** n=169 Close to half, 68% of the responses came from respondents who identified as being 30-64 years old, 17% of the respondents identified as being over 65 and 8% as being 20–29 years old.



#### Gender | n=166

70% of the 166 responses came from respondents who identified as being women and 22% from those who identified as being men. 8% of the participants preferred not to answer.



#### Point of Engagement | n = 166

Over half of the respondents heard about the project through notices received in mail, 23% from friends, family or neighbours and 7% from either lawn signages in the proejct area or through the local Councillor.
