Toronto's Walking Strategy



Toronto's Walking Strategy was adopted by Toronto City Council in 2009 and includes three priorities:



Universal Accessibility

All public and private places and spaces should be barrier-free.



Safety

The safety of pedestrians takes precedence over all other modes of transportation.



Design Excellence

High-quality design creates a positive experience for everyone.



Policies and Guidelines



- Sidewalks are a critical piece of infrastructure that provide a **safe and accessible route** for people to travel in the neighbourhood.
- The City's Missing Sidewalk Policy states
 that sidewalks should be built, where they are
 missing, on both sides of arterial and collector
 roads, and on one or both sides of local roads.
- Transportation Services reviews opportunities to install sidewalks with other state-of-goodrepair roadway or utility work whenever possible.



Why Sidewalks?




- Sidewalks offer protected, dedicated space for all pedestrians.
- Sidewalks reduce barriers to access for vulnerable populations including children, seniors and persons with disabilities.
- **Provide connections** to the neighbourhood for residents, transit users, seniors and children walking to school.
- Increase visibility of pedestrians and provide wintermaintained walking surface.
- Most local roads have residential land uses, and where sidewalks are missing, pedestrians have no alternative but to walk on the roadway.



Why Now?




- This neighbourhood has existing gaps in the sidewalk network.
- The **best opportunity** to install sidewalks, where they are missing, is when road work is planned.
- This provides the most flexibility in design to minimize impacts within the public right-of-way (i.e. trees, driveways, etc.).
- There is planned road resurfacing in 2025 on Monarchdale Avenue, Parkchester Road, Westchester Road and Noranda Drive.
- **Preventative measures**, such as resurfacing, improves the road surface while keeping the concrete road base in a state of good repair, **extending the lifespan of the infrastructure**.



Noranda Drive | New Sidewalk on North Side



- New 1.5m sidewalk proposed on north side of Noranda Drive.
- Portion of new sidewalk to be built within the existing roadway.
- Road width would be narrowed from 8.6m to 8.0m which would still allow for two-way motor vehicle traffic.
- No impacts to properties, trees, driveway parking spaces, traffic flow or on-street parking.



Monarchdale Avenue | New Sidewalk on North Side †


- New 1.5m sidewalk proposed on north side of Monarchdale Avenue.
- Portion of new sidewalk to be built within the existing roadway.
- Road width would be narrowed from 8.6m to 8.0m which would still allow for two-way motor vehicle traffic.
- **No impacts** to properties, trees, driveway parking spaces, traffic flow or on-street parking.



Monarchdale Avenue | Bump-outs





- **Two bump-outs** are planned to be installed on Monarchdale Avenue to **preserve mature trees**.
- Bump-outs improve the **safety and visibility** of pedestrians and **discourages vehicle speeding**.
- No parking anytime fronting the two bump-outs (impact to four on-street parking spaces).
- Existing on-street parking and traffic operations will **not be impacted** for the remainder of Monarchdale Avenue.



Examples of Existing Sidewalk Bump-Outs








Westchester Road | New Sidewalk on North Side




- New 1.5m sidewalk proposed on north side of Westchester Road.
- Portion of new sidewalk to be built within the existing roadway.
- Road width would be narrowed from 8.6m to 8.0m which would still allow for two-way motor vehicle traffic.
- **No impacts** to properties, trees, driveway parking spaces, traffic flow or on-street parking.



Parkchester Road | New Sidewalk on Northwest Side




- New 1.5m sidewalk proposed on northwest side of Parkchester Road.
- Portion of new sidewalk to be built within the existing roadway.
- Road width would be narrowed from 8.2m to 7.4m between Brookhaven Drive and Westchester Road which would still allow for two-way motor vehicle traffic.
- Road width would be narrowed from 8.6m to 8.0m between Westchester Road and Noranda Drive which would still allow for two-way motor vehicle traffic.
- No impacts to properties, trees, driveway parking spaces, traffic flow or on-street parking.



Parkchester Road | Bump-out



- One bump-out planned to be installed on Parkchester Road to retain existing tree.
- No parking anytime on the northwest side of Parkchester Road fronting 35 Westchester Road.
- Currently, there is existing no parking anytime on the southeast side of the street (impact to two on-street parking spaces).
- Existing on-street parking and traffic operations will not be impacted for the remainder of Parkchester Road.



Recommendations and Next Steps



- Discuss project specific details and concerns from public meeting and revise design where feasible.
- Report 2025 Missing Sidewalk projects, including Monarchdale Avenue, Parkchester Road, Westchester Road and Noranda Drive, to City of Toronto's Infrastructure and Environment Committee on July 10, 2025, and to City Council on July 23, 2025.
- Residents to receive pre-construction and construction notices.
- Construction scheduled to commence Fall 2025.
