

# **Hepatitis C Treatment Coverage in Ontario**

This document summarizes different hepatitis C treatment reimbursement channels in Ontario. For additional information, visit the <u>CATIE website</u> or the Ontario Hepatitis C Elimination Roadmap website.

### Scenario A: People with OHIP

People with Ontario Works or Ontario Disability Support Program (OW/ODSP): Limited Use Code can be used (see Ontario Drug Benefit Formulary).

**People with Non-insured Health Benefits (NIHB) Program**: If the patient is eligible for Ontario Drug Benefit, Limited Use code can be used (see Ontario Drug Benefit Formulary). Otherwise go through Non-insured health benefits.

#### People with private insurance:

Go through the private insurance first. If the full cost cannot be covered, <u>Trillium Drug Benefits</u> and <u>Pharmaceutical Assistance Program</u> (see page 2) are available.

**People with none of the above**: Submit applications for <u>Trillium Drug Benefits</u> and <u>Pharmaceutical Assistance Program</u> (see page 2).



#### Scenario B: People Who are Incarcerated

**People incarcerated in provincial institutions**: The Ontario Ministry of the Solicitor General will cover treatment during incarceration and link to community treaters where needed.

**People incarcerated in federal institutions**: Correctional Services Canada will cover treatment cost during incarceration.

Upon release, continue with treatment coverage according to <u>Scenario A</u>. The Ontario Ministry of the Solicitor General will dispense the medication for the remainder of the month if people have started treatment during incarceration. <u>Pharmaceutical compassionate access</u> programs can provide bridging medication until coverage is obtained (see page 2).





## **Scenario C: Immigrants and Newcomers**

**People with visitor visa and temporary workers**: No reimbursement available until their status changes.

**International student**: May be covered through school's health insurance, though medication coverage is usually limited. Otherwise, no reimbursement available until their status changes.

**Permanent resident**: refer to <u>Scenario A</u> (see page 1).


**Refugee applicant**: Cost can be covered by Interim Federal Health Program.

People with no status: It is possible that cost can be covered through

<u>pharmaceutical compassionate access</u> programs (see below).

People relocating from another province and territory: Apply for OHIP first and

refer to Scenario A (see page 1).



## Pharmaceutical assistance programs

The pharmaceutical companies that make hepatitis C medications have programs to help people access and complete treatment.

AbbVie has the AbbVie Care Program for people taking Maviret (glecaprevir and pibrentasvir).
