

Project Background





- The project was initiated when a resident-led community steering committee, with the support of Councillor Saxe, approached TMU
- The community steering committee included the Thornwood II Development Committee, North Rosedale Resident Association, South Rosedale Association, and ABC Resident Association
- The Pricefield Park Design Group was a student-led team and formed through an urban planning and design studio class
- Supervised by Professor Shelagh McCartney, the group undertook a re-conception of Pricefield Road Playground through the application of learned skills and knowledge
- The design process was guided by feedback from local residents and stakeholders
- The group maintained communications with local residents, Councillor Saxe's Office and other City staff throughout the project
- The project was driven by local residents and TMU students, and supported by City staff



What We Heard: Areas for Improvement

- Recreation opportunities for a broader range of age groups
- Improving sightlines and lighting
- Additional seating
- Improve wayfinding and connectivity to the surrounding neighbourhood context
- Improve existing amenities in the park (such as playground facilities)



What We Heard: Opportunities

- The additional capacity to facilitate social interaction
- Increased opportunities for circulation and walking paths in the park
- The ability to incorporate Indigenous and ecological stewardship into park design
- Increase signage and wayfinding
- The ability to increase safety and visibility through lighting and adaptive maintenance
- Increase in accessibility by increasing amenities that include all residents



What we Heard: Diverging Opinions

- The incorporation of an off-leash or unfenced dog area within the park
- The current or future state of facility maintenance, particularly in reference to snow removal and winter maintenance
- Improved connections to Toronto's Core Circle and Ravine System
- How to address community safety and ways to mitigate interference with the existing sense of safety in the neighbourhood



Vision Statement

- "Pricefield Road Playground will function as a community hub that enhances public life by fostering social connections. It will serve all community members' recreational needs and desires as the neighbourhood grows over time. The park will maintain its existing natural beauty while acting as a gateway into the City's wider ravine and trail system to strengthen visitors' connections to the natural landscapes of Toronto."




Guiding Principles

- Restoring connections to natural and Indigenous heritage through access to local ravines and native horticulture




Student Study -Option 1: The Web






Student Study Option 2: Gathering Hub





Student's Final Concept



"After consolidating and analyzing the feedback from public engagement, the final design was created. The engagement process from community members informed the design culminating in eight outdoor rooms that appeal to the identified needs. This process demonstrated the need to include comprehensive improvements outside of these rooms. The design concept consists of adding three major and three minor paths that connect the park entrances and the different uses throughout. In addition, improvements to park entrances, seating, and lighting have been considered."



- In early 2024, CCxA Landscape Architects joined TMU students and the community steering committee to help develop their design concept.
- February 13, 2024: TMU students presented their final design concept to Councillor Saxe. See photos at left.
- April 15, 2024: CCxA submitted a park visioning report outlining the TMU student visioning and community outreach as well as their initial concept plan for potential improvements.
- September 13, 2024: CCxA submitted a refined visioning report.
- March 27, 2025: City Council authorized the General Manager, Parks and Recreation, to accept an in-kind donation of up to \$620,000 from Scrivener Square Nominee Inc. (the donor) for design and construction administration services by CCxA for playground enhancement and park improvements at Pricefield Road Playground (Motion 2025.M28.4).
- City of Toronto Parks and Recreation Division undertakes and leads project implementation, ensuring design is developed through public engagement and City standards and regulations are met.
- Construction funds will be allocated from community benefit funding source.
- City to oversee and manage construction of approved design.

Existing Conditions - Opportunities for Improvement




- Congested southern half of park
- Dense shade (groundcover can't thrive)
- Tree species (existing aggressive trees like Norway Maples)
- Dirt and mud under tree canopy
- Program is not intentional (missing for teens and adults)
- Safety (train track proximity and lighting)
- Pedestrian traffic and movement

Big Moves

- Lengthen the walk through the park, improve accessibility and circulation
- Provide play for all ages: Multi-generational activities
- Provide moments for group gatherings
- Increase comfort: Green buffers around park perimeter
- Improve park furniture
- Maximize spatial structure: Occupy entire park, make it feel intentional
- Preserve healthy/relevant tree canopy
- Provide sensory experiences through art/water feature
- Increase safety: Lighting updates (TBD)
- Connect the city with the ravine







Precedent Cristina Enea Park, Spain - Formal Paths












Precedent Cristina Enea Park, Spain - Informal Paths









Precedent Love Park, Toronto - No Straight Paths








