Land Acknowledgment

Why Toronto matters – and why it's facing big challenges







TORONTO IS THE ECONOMIC ENGINE OF THE COUNTRY

- Accounts for 1 in every 5 jobs in Ontario.
- Responsible for **60% of public infrastructure and majority of services** people rely on daily, across all orders of government.
- Powers a diverse economy, with **over 1.3 million employed residents** across a wide range of industries.
- Toronto Region alone contributes to 20% of Canada's GDP.
- Attracts more than 26 million visitors annually.

TORONTO IS THE LARGEST CITY IN CANADA WITH OVER 3 MILLION PEOPLE AND GROWING.

Toronto has the largest municipal first responder service in Canada


Toronto's significant challenges

As the largest city in Canada, Toronto's challenges are complex...

- Has more than 3 million residents, with over 35% growth in past 10 years.
- Toronto area is now the fastest-growing metropolitan area in North America.
- Growing demand for city services and supports.
- Limited revenue tools largely disconnected from economic growth, with heavy reliance on property tax.
- Needs sustainable, long-term financial support to address systemic funding gaps.

MAKING LIFE MORE AFFORDABLE



- Provided 48.4 million nutritious meals to more than 257,000 kids through expanded school food programs.
- Kept over 3,800 families housed thanks to the Eviction Prevention and Rent Bank Programs.
- Introduced new rules to protect renters from unfair evictions.
- Cut development fees to unlock 8,000 affordable homes and sped up
 6,000 rental units.
- Added 2,835 new child care spots with fees capped at \$22/day.

MOVING TORONTO BETTER



- Stopped TTC fare increases and added 500,000 more service hours (a 5.8 % increase).
- Bought 55 new subway cars to Line 2 in partnership with other orders of government.
- Increased streetcar service to every 6 minutes or less on Dundas, St.
 Clair and Bathurst.
- Improved Bus service on 11 busy routes to cut down on bus bunching.
- Added 100 traffic agents to reduce congestion.
- Started building the Scarborough Bus way.
- Repaired more than 215,096 potholes (as of September and counting).

BUILDING A SAFER TORONTO FOR EVERYONE



- Added 263 new emergency workers (firefighters, police and paramedics) to keep people safe.
- Expanded programs to prevent youth violence, including recreation programs in priority neighbourhoods that served 1,800 youth at 45 locations.
- Strengthened road safety to keep people walking, cycling and driving safe.
- Expanded Toronto Community Crisis Service city-wide to get people the mental health and social supports they need.


DELIVERING EXCELLENT COMMUNITY SERVICES



- All 100 library branches are now open longer on Sundays (as of Oct 19).
- Prioritized cleanliness at recreation centres and outdoor pools by hiring more custodial staff.
- Kept outdoor pools open 2 hours longer every day.
- Provided more than 800 residents in long-term care homes with personalized, compassionate care.
- Further **reduced property taxes for small businesses** to keep neighbourhoods vibrant.
- Supported more than 3,592 people to move from the shelter system into permanent housing.
- Launched early registration for local residents at six free community recreation centres.

Toronto's multi-year journey to a stronger financial future

OUR CHALLENGES ARE TOO GREAT TO BE SOLVED IN ONE YEAR




What We've Done:

- Strengthened the City's multi-year approach to financial stability.
- Identified \$620 million in 2024 and \$680 million in 2025 through reductions and offsets.
- Secured \$1.23 billion in **operating support** over three years (2024–2026) through the New Deal with the Province.
- Achieved a credit rating upgrade to AA+ in 2024—the first increase in decades.

What We Need to Do:

- Focus on protecting and delivering critical services.
- Continue identifying budget reductions and offsets.
- Secure long-term funding commitments from the federal and provincial governments.




