Introduction to the document

Overview of the event

Nuit Blanche Toronto is a free, all-night celebration of contemporary art. The event takes place every year from sunset to sunrise. Artists from Toronto, Canada, and around the world create installations, performances and experiences for everyone to enjoy.

The art is presented in public spaces, parks, streets and buildings across the city. You can walk, roll, or ride between different locations and explore the artworks at your own pace.

Nuit Blanche happens only once a year, for one night, and the city is transformed into a large, outdoor art gallery. The event is open to all and is meant to be welcoming and fun.

Overview of the exhibition area

Poetic Justice is one of the exhibitions at Nuit Blanche Toronto. It is curated by Charlene K. Lau.

This exhibition looks at Toronto as both Indigenous homelands and as a city where people arrive from all over the world. The artworks explore ideas of land, treaties, justice, and community care.

Artists participatory performance, sculptural installations, video and text-based works to bring these ideas into public spaces. The works invite us to listen, reflect and imagine how we can build a more just and connected future together.

How to use this document

This guide is here to help you get ready for Nuit Blanche Toronto. It gives you information about what to expect at the event, including the artworks, locations and what the experience might feel like.

You can use the guide in any way that works best for you:

- Before the event read through to learn about the art and plan what you want to see.
- **During the event** use it to remind yourself of what's happening and where.
- After the event look back at what you experienced and reflect on the night.

The guide is written in plain language to make it clear and easy to understand. Some pages include images or visual descriptions to help you picture what the event will be like.

There is no right or wrong way to use this guide. You can read it all at once or skip to the parts that matter most to you.

The projects in this guide are listed in the order we recommend experiencing them, but you can also enjoy them in reverse or in any order that works best for you.

Information Services and Audience Support

Event Centre

The Event Centre is the central hub for Nuit Blanche visitors, offering services to help you enjoy your night. The downtown exhibition event centre is located on Dundas Street west between Beverley Street and McCaul Street. The Event Centre includes:

- Accessible portable washrooms
- ASL interpretation during event hours
- Food trucks, water refill stations, and waste/recycling bins
- Information tent with staff and volunteers distributing maps and answering questions
- Navigation Cube with maps, wayfinding, and event details visible from all sides

Info Centres

Each exhibition area includes Information Centres staffed by volunteers. Here, you can pick up printed maps, get directions to nearby projects, or find the closest washrooms and services. Info Centres are designed to be clear meeting points and help visitors navigate the night.

The downtown exhibition has two Info Centres. The west Info Centre is located at Dundas Street West and Spadina Avenue just north of Dundas Street West. The east Info Centre is located on Nathan Philips Square just south of the ramp to the green roof.

Volunteers

Volunteers are stationed across Nuit Blanche to assist visitors throughout the night. They can answer questions, provide directions, distribute maps, and help connect you to accessibility resources. Look for volunteers in Nuit Blanche identification—many are mobile and circulate between projects to support audience needs.








