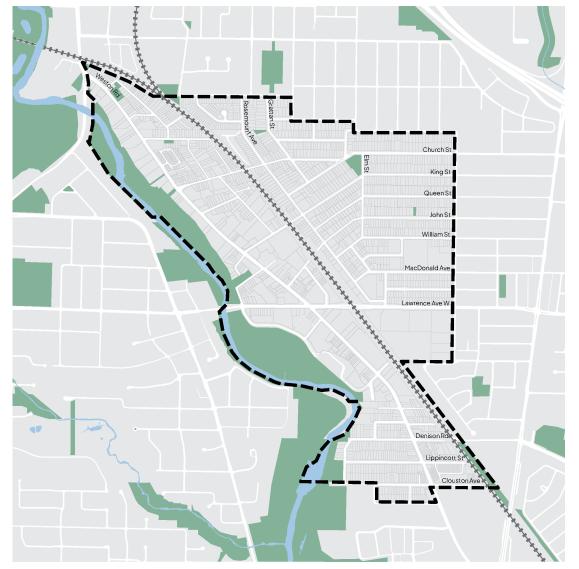

Phase 2

Emerging Development Direction

- Prepare final report with recommendations
- Summarize how community feedback informed final report

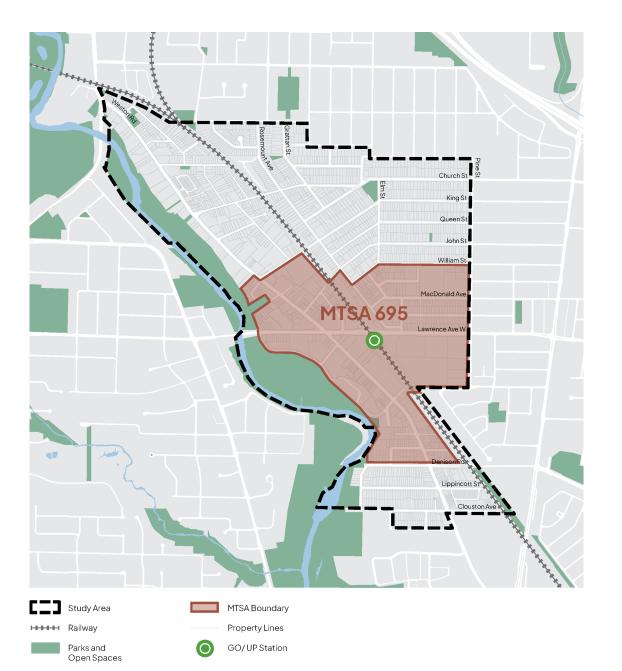

- Urban Structure

Major Transit Station Area (MTSA)

- Higher Order Transit
- Satisfy provincially set minimum density targets
- 500-800m around the station
 (Approximately a 10-miniute walk)

Implementation Tools: Site and Area Specific Policies (SASP) & Urban Design Guidelines (UDG)

SASP

- Go beyond the City wide policies in the Official Plan
- Guide growth on a more local and context-specific level
- Policies on things like the characteristics of buildings, heritage, community services and facilities, public spaces, and how people move around.

UDG

- Shape and guide how buildings, streets, and public spaces should look and function
- Guidelines on things like the look and feel of buildings, how buildings interact with the street, public spaces and landscaping, and movement and connections.

- Housing affordability
- Displacement (housing, businesses, human service agencies)

Key Strengths

- "Main street" character along Weston Road and village-like feel
- Diversity of communities and identities
- Indigenous heritage and location along the Carrying Place Trail
- Variety of housing options, businesses, land uses
- Sites that could redevelop to accommodate growth and intensification
- Access to the Weston GO/UP Station
- Community hubs and gathering places
- Network of parks and opens spaces in the Humber Valley









Key Challenges

- Heavy reliance on cars and traffic
- Streets and public spaces feel empty or unsafe at night
- Linkages and connection between Weston Village and the Humber Valley
- Small sites may need to be assembled to be redeveloped
- New development can be hard to make work financially for developers
- Transition from high density development along
 Weston Road to low-density neighbourhoods
- Lack of cycling infrastructure
- Inconsistent pedestrian connections and infrastructure
- Threat of Displacement









Key Opportunities

- Encourage redevelopment within a short walk of Weston GO/UP Station
- Preserve and add to the range of housing options
- Preserve the historic character of Weston
- Introduce uses that bring life and activity at street level
- Have streets serve many purposes
- Encourage inclusion of space that is needed for community services and facilities
- Promote independent and safe movement of children and youth
- Highlight the unique character of different parts of Weston and create distinct places

Weston is a place of welcome. It is a place where longstanding and new communities coexist and mix, all contributing to the richness of the area. Growth, development and improvement will occur in a manner which recognizes its past, contributes to the area's diversity and improves the quality of life of the people who live, work in and visit the area.

Guiding Principles

- Belonging & Diversity
 Support a mix of housing, shops, and spaces welcoming to all.
- Heart of the Village
 Preserve Weston Road's main street character as a community focal point.
- Living Public Spaces
 Improve the quality of public spaces, including streets, parks and open spaces.
- Weaving in New Growth
 Integrate new buildings into Weston in way that contribute to vitality, comfort and animation, and appropriately transitions to public spaces and low-density areas.

Guiding Principles

- Honouring the Past
 - Celebrate Weston's the unique characteristics of Weston formed by its past.
- Community Services & Amenities
 - Provide community services and facilities to serve the community well and treat network of parks and open spaces as a green jewel.
- Improving Connections
 - Link neighbourhoods with better access to shops, parks, schools, and the river.
- Walking & Cycling First
 - Make walking and cycling safe, comfortable, and connected to transit and trails.
