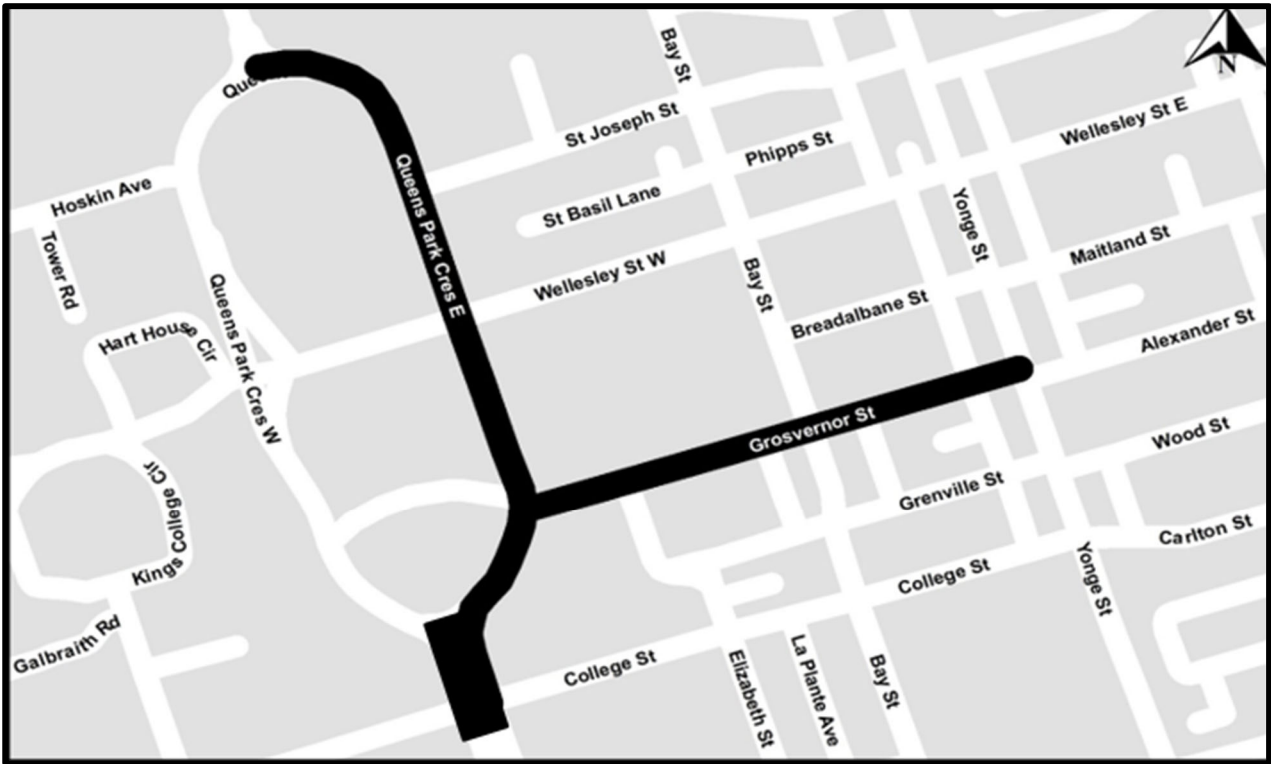

This notice provides an update on the planned winter construction break for the watermain replacement and road resurfacing work on Grosvenor Street and Queen’s Park Crescent.

Construction activities in this area are expected to pause before December 24, 2025, and the contractor will demobilize from the site at that time. All traffic lanes on Queen’s Park Crescent will reopen, two-way traffic on Grosvenor Street will still be maintained, and the cycling track will be fully reopened. Work is planned to resume **January 19, 2026**, weather permitting.

We know this project has an impact on all businesses along Grosvenor Street and Queen’s Park Crescent. We appreciate your patience with the dust, noise, fencing and other inconveniences while we work to complete this City infrastructure project.

WORK STATUS TO DATE

- The City's contractor has completed:
- Utility investigations
 - Majority of the 150 mm watermain on Queen’s Park Crescent East
 - Half of the 200 mm watermain on Grosvenor Street
 - Temporary restoration

REMAINING WORK

- Work crews will complete:
- The remainder of the watermain replacement and connections on Queen’s Park Crescent East and Grosvenor Street
 - Permanent restoration and road resurfacing including new concrete curbs to separate the bikes lanes
